### Kay's Kitchen

As with this it is a chilly 54 degree day, and cloudy. The kind of weather that makes soup the most appealing dish. So this week I'll be serving you some good hearty soup recipes, for now or later.

### FALL GARDEN SOUP

This simply involves using any vegetables you have too much of, or vegetables that need using. I have used the following combination:

- 11 tomatoes
- 4 cups potatoes
- 6 carrots
- 4 small rutabagas
- 8 cups nuchini
- 1/2 cup garlic

Peel and chunk vegetables. Saute onions with garlic cube in large pot with needed amount of margarine. Add vegetables and cover with water. Add a generous amount of spices. Use three or four leafy leaves from the herb garden, plus a curry to taste. If you do not like curry, omit that. Really it is a matter of seasoning to your own taste. Not over-season and lose the fresh taste of the vegetables. Add enough milk of dried basil to suit. Cook until vegetables are tender. If you did not add too much water to cook the vegetables, the soup will have cooked down and will be thick enough milk to make soup the desired thickness.

### QUICK POTATO SOUP

- 2 cups thinly sliced potatoes
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- 1 teaspoon worcestershire sauce
- Salt to taste
- Pepper

Cook potatoes and onion in water until tender. Mash potatoes slightly with fork to thicken soup if desired. Add milk, margarine and seasonings. Heat, but do not boil. For color add 1/2 cup cream, grated cheese or crisp crumbled bacon.
