## With 'Bama on their minds Wildcats headed for Kansas

The University of Kentucky Wildcats sporting a season record after a fourth-quarter, 25-10, loss to Alabama, this weekend to face a Jayhawk team that took last weekend off after opening victories over Tulsa and Oregon. Kansas is led by Keweenaw Bell, sophomore quarterback who was named Defensive Player of the Year in the Big Eight Conference last season. He rushed for 1,114 yards to become the

14th freshman in the history of the NCAA to go over 1,000 yards. He undoubtedly is one of the greatest backs in the country. Wildcat coach Fran Curry said, "Kansas also has a big, fast defense. They appear to have a winning attitude, which is the biggest thing they have going. They are starting to believe in themselves. We will have to be very careful with 18 yards in 49 carries. His high school teammate Frank Seurer has hit on 17

or 18 passes for 242 yards and a touchdown. He has thrown five interceptions. Bucky Scribner, a junior punter, was ranked fourth in the nation before last week's games, punting 13 times for 656 yards, an average of 50.5 yards per punt with a long kick of 63 yards. Curry called his team's effort against Alabama "one of the most courageous games ever played by a football team."

"We've played good enough to win," he said, "but great football teams do what they have to do to win and Alabama did that. Some teams are good enough to hang on and others have to keep themselves all the way."

## Junior high gridders beat Madison 16-8

It was a big win Monday night for the Nicholas County Bluejackets' junior high football team as they out-fought a South Hartwood Madison squad. First quarter they pumpeled into the end zone on a seven yard run by running back Geno Terry. Despite a strong run back of the ensuing kickoff by David McGuffey, the Jackets were unable to take advantage of the first position and were forced to punt. Beechwood sup-

plied a strong return, some crushing plays by Senior running back Scott Clare, and marched in for a second score in the first quarter. With a 13-0 lead they missed the extra point attempt. Beechwood took an onside kickoff, and recovered the ball right at mid-field.
