Injury accident reported

Two automobile accidents have been reported by the Nicholas County Sheriff's office and one woman was sent to a Lexington hospital as a result.

According to Sheriff's records, M. The cable was apparently on the back end of the Pinyon vehicle, flew off, struck the road, flew back into the air striking the windshield and top of the Alexander car, causing heavy damage.

The other accident took place on Shoy Creek Road, about nine miles north of Carlisle. The call came in at 3:18 a.m. on April 21. A two-ton truck driven by Duane Woodruff of Ewing, pulling a trailer, rounded a curve and veered off the road. The driver, Sharon D. Coffey, 25, of Paris. No one was injured and a passenger in the Coffey vehicle, Kay Luther, was also not reported injured.

Three fire calls in county

Summer camp now available for retarded

Summer camps, a time for young people to have wholesome fun, learn to cooperate with others, grow closer to nature, and for thousands of children and young people across the country, each summer brings the excitement and joyful activities as parents leave their children for the annual summer camp outing.

But not for all these children and young people have special needs, and no camps, no activities, and no group outings. These young people have mental retardation.

Ten years ago the Bluegrass Comprehensive Care Center started Camp Bluegrass. The camp, located in Clark County, is designed to meet the needs of this special group of people. But this year, with government funds having been sharply reduced, donations are needed to keep Camp Bluegrass open.

The Bluegrass Regional Mental Health-Mental Retardation Board is the agency that runs the Comprehensive Care Centers in this district, has formed a Fund Development Committee. The committee, chaired by L.F. Kendall, Manufacturing Manager at IBM, has as its goal to raise \$8,000. Nicholas County's share has been set at \$100.

If the full amount is raised, Mr. Kendall said, three one-week camping sessions will be held with an attendance of approximately 120 persons. If
