### Bluejackets to scrimmage Colonels here Friday

The Nicholas County Bluejackets football team will scrimmage the Bourbon County Colonels here in Carlisle at our local field Friday night at 8 p.m., Coach Ben Pumphrey has announced.

"This promises to be a difficult year for the Bluejackets, since we return only two offensive linemen and no defensive linemen or linebackers from last year's team," Pumphrey said.

"There is a little experience in the backfield, but this must definitely be a rebuilding year for our last year's district champions.

"We have several youngsters trying out for the team who have good size, but all are green and it will take time," Pumphrey added.

Bourbon County has a new coach this year and "good personnel" but are reportedly having the same problems as Nicholas County.

"They will be well-drilled," Pumphrey said, "and well disciplined and will be working on mastering new techniques. It is expected they will give our youngsters a good education."

On Friday, Aug. 20, the Bluejackets will scrimmage a team that Coach Pumphrey calls "the super power" of high school football in Kentucky — Henry Clay. "The scrimmage will be part of the CCC preseason at Woodford County in Versailles.

"They will further our education and make us aware of the perils of the real world."

Coach Pumphrey said it would be a good thing if the Bluejackets could perform credibly with these two teams and be prepared for the 11 games of the schedule which count.

Spectators are reminded that these two contests are scrimmages, which means they are practices and fans must stay in the stands and not get in the way of players, officials or coaches during the action.

Starters had not been determined for the first scrimmage but some of those expected to see action are David Hunter at center, Keith Williams at fullback, Ken Baker at right end, Terry Loeffler at right guard and Hoboy Hopkins, Patric McElroy, Steve Anderson and Rocky Young in the backfield.

"We will put out a roster next week."

## Little League All-Stars win

The Nicholas County Little League All-Stars captured the championship of their own invitational tournament held last week at the Carlisle recreation park. The locals defeated Montgomery County East 4-0 in the final game. Today they went the distance on the mound in picking up his fifth pitching victory during this season's All-Star competition.

Nicholas trailed 3-0 in the bottom of the third with one out when they doubled. Tip Fryman singled and Chris Hiller doubled and scored on a

Montgomery throwing error. Nicholas got five more runs in the fourth. Ray Phillips and Bryan Brerly walked and Clay's single scored Phillips. Fryman drew another base on balls and Chris Anderson singled a grand slam deep over the right field fence. The round-tripper was Anderson's 19th during this season's All-Star competition.

Nicholas County will compete in the Anderson County Invitational this weekend at Lawrenceburg. They have previously won the Lee County Tournament at Lawrenceburg on page 11.

## Blood drive is Monday

Mark Monday, August 9, on your calendar. From 14:30 p.m. and from 8:30 a.m. your presence is requested at a blood drive to be held at the Carlisle United Methodist Church.

Blood transfusions broke all existing records for the month of June according to sources at the Central Kentucky Blood Center. "Several reasons may be affecting this increase, but summer is always a difficult period," commented Ms. Carolyn Folsch, C.R.B.C. representative. "One thing that we often see is a decrease in donations due to summer vacations. This depletes the total supply of blood available to patients, however, this year has been worse than most. Just when donations are getting fewer, we have had a surge

of demands for blood."

The Nicholas County Blood Program has also seen a decrease in donations. "Last year at this time, there were a total of 180 pints donated. This year, there are 169. Even those 20 pints can make a difference when multiplied by decreased donations in other areas."

Ms. Folsch stated, "We not only need to catch-up, we need to get ahead so that the supply of blood will be sufficient to meet all demands. We really depend on Nicholas Countyans to do their part and hope that other groups will follow their lead."

## Catholic church set to be dedicated

For the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe August 15 is a special day. Not only is this date the day that Catholics throughout the world celebrate the Assumption of Mary into Heaven (Mary the Mother of Jesus Christ, Son of God) — it will also be the day for the Catholics of Nicholas County to dedicate their new church on Main Street and Eastern Avenue.

The Most Reverend William A. Hughes, Bishop of Diocese of Covington, will consecrate the dedication Mass with the Pastor, Reverend Joseph Saulton and former Pastor, Reverend Herman Hamlage, and other priests of the Diocese. A choir composed of members from both the Catholic and First Christian churches will sing.

The New Shrine will seat approximately 180 people. Besides the church proper, there is a multi-purpose hall to be used for many different affairs. The stone foundation of the old church forms a wall for a Meditation garden that will be gradually developed.

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## National Champion

### Rifleman Presley Kendall wins

Preliminary results show that Presley W. Kendall of Carlisle has won the 1982 National Smallbore Rifle Prone Metallic Sight Championship, part of the 1982 National Matches held at Camp Perry, Ohio.

Kendall claimed his title Saturday with a score of 319-24X out of a possible 320-25X. The X's represent the number of shots fired through the center ring.

David Weaver, of Oil City, Pa., placed second with a score of 218-22X and Army Reserve Capt. William Beuret, of Pittsburgh, Pa., came in third with a score of 212-27X.

The metallic sight championship is determined by the highest combined score from eight separate matches, fired from one position, 50 meters, 50 yards, 100 yards and the Dewar Match Course (16-100 yards). This course of fire was repeated over two days.

Kendall won the Dewar Course Metallic Sight Match with a score of 49-5X, and the 100 Yard Metallic Sight Match with a score of 60-4X. He also placed second in Tuesday's Dewar Course with a score of 60-4X. The highest possible score in each of these matches was 60-6X.

The Women's Smallbore Rifle Prone Metallic Sight Championship was taken by Carolyn Millard of Tallahassee, Fla., with a score of 218-22X. Millard also won the first daily 100 Yard Metallic Sight Match with a score of 40-5X.

The results from the Metallic Sight Championship Matches will be added to the aggregate scores from the smallbore rifle prone Any Sight Championship Matches to determine the overall 1982 National Smallbore Rifle Prone Champion.

The 1982 National Matches consist of three phases: pistol, smallbore rifle and highpower rifle, and are jointly sponsored by the National Rifle Association of America and the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice. Nearly 3,000 top marksmen from around the country compete this year for top honors in this "world series" of shooting sports.

The Champion Shooting Club cap-

tured both the Smallbore Rifle Metallic Sight and Any Sight prone team matches at the National Matches at Camp Perry. They scored 156-12X, a possible 160-16X points to win the Metallic Sight Team Match, and won the Any Sight Team Match with 160-12X of 160-16X points. The X-count refers to the number of shots fired into the center X-ring of the target's bullseye.

Members of the Champion Shooting Club were Ronald O. West from Zanesville, Ohio; Carl C. Jones from New Albany, Ohio; Presley W. Kendall
