New student loan you don't have to pay back

If you want to be a science or math teacher, the Kentucky Department of Education has an offer that's hard to refuse — a loan that you don't have to pay back.

The department hopes to have more teachers in those areas with a student loan and just an end to a shortage of teachers in those areas with a student loan program.

In a National Science Teachers Association survey conducted in December 1981, secondary school principals reported that among newly employed science and math teachers, 8.3 percent were unqualified to teach science or math.

To help alleviate the problem, the Kentucky General Assembly, at the request of the Public Instruction Board, designated \$20,000 for the 1982 and 1983 school years to be loaned to students who were teaching science and math in Kentucky schools.

The unusual part of the program comes with the method of repaying the loan. A year of the loan will be forgiven for each year of science or math taught in a Kentucky school.

According to Frank Howard with the Dept. of Education, approximately 60 students in 1982 and 60 more to use with a science or math major will receive loans for as much as \$2,500.

Application must be filed with the student's college of education by Aug. 1, and applicants, junior and senior undergraduates are eligible. Each eligible institution will, in consultation with the state, establish a program to receive the money from this program they should be aware of their intent.

If a loan is not repaid, the individual's teaching certificate will be revoked unless outstanding amounts can be proven. However, if the individual's financial situation improves, each eligible institution will, in consultation with the state, establish a program to receive the money from this program they should be aware of their intent.

If a student receives a loan and decides not to teach, they must pay the loan back at the current interest rate on treasury notes plus three percent. Howard explained, "Other financial aid programs are at a much lower interest rate so before they take money from this program they should be aware of their intent."
