## Record loan Reported by FmHA in Nicholas, Harrison

The local Farmers Home Administration office in Nicholas has announced it has loaned a record volume of loan funds for the office in fiscal year 1982. The period covered is Oct. 1, 1981 to Sept. 30, 1982.

The Nicholas FmHA office serves both Harrison and Nicholas Counties. County Office Clerk for the Nicholas FmHA Office, states that the Nicholas office loaned a total of \$7,202,690 in fiscal year 1982. Total loans were 208.

Lecher explains, "We are not in the business of breaking records, but we are in the lending business of aiding rural families that cannot obtain their needed credit from other lending institutions. The main reason our dollars loaned were so high is due to poor crops in this area during 1981 and due to the present depressed economy."

The Nicholas FmHA office is in District IV in the State of Kentucky. The counties in the District are Harrison, Nicholas, Penderflem, Campbell, Bourbon, Clark, Madison, Letcher, Fayette, Jessamine, Harrods, Anderson, Boyle, Lincoln, Garrard and Woodford. In District IV, the FmHA also made a total of 1,175 farmer and housing type loans for a total of \$29,078,716. The Nicholas office made 208 loans and one grant for a total of \$7,202,690. \$4,548,100 in Harrison County and \$2,654,590 in Nicholas County or 14.5 percent of the District money and 17.5 percent of all loans made in the District.

A breakdown of the percentage of loan funds in the Nicholas office made in the District are as follows: 51 percent of the Operating Loans, 61 percent of Emergency Loans, 20 percent of the Farm Ownership Loans, 18 percent of the Rural Housing Loans and 41 percent of the Rural Rental Housing

The Rural Rental Housing Loans were processed by the district office in Lexington.

Lecher attributes the successful year to his co-workers. "I want to commend Ben Tandy, Assistant County Supervisor; Robin Chastion, County Office Assistant; and Corlette Rivers, County Office Clerk for the excellent job they have done. These employees are very dedicated and have done an excellent job aiding the rural families of this community and our goal is to extend that done previously but to continue to serve the rural families in their need. With the leadership of the State Director, Eudell Sisson, I feel this will be accomplished," Lecher said.

**Loan now getting 26% of burley**

The market for Burley tobacco was not quite so good during the week ending Thursday as it was during the week ending Wednesday. The Federal-State Market News Service's general price averages showed small declines from the week before and quality was also lower. The proportion of the heavy volume placed under loan increased. Thursday totaled 120,897,296 pounds and averaged \$13.07 per hundred, down \$1.08 from last week. For the season, 346,587,400 pounds have been sold for an average of \$130.75. During the same number of sales days last year 207.7 million pounds averaged \$179. It is a 1 to 1 total of 1,200,000 pounds for the season.

Lower prices were recorded for around 50 percent of the grades this week. Most loans were only \$1 per person.

## TTI System files \$226 million suit

TTI Systems Inc. a Lexington based transportation company, announced Thursday, Dec. 7, that it has filed suit against CSX Corporation and two of its railroad subsidiaries, the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company and the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad Company charging them with violations of federal and state antitrust laws. The suit, filed in Federal Court in Lexington, seeks a sum of \$226,338,000, which could be tripled as punitive damages under the federal antitrust laws. In addition, two subsidiaries of TTI Systems Inc., Trans Kentucky Transportation Railroad Inc. and Transcontinental Terminals Inc. have joined in the suit against CSX Corporation and its subsidiaries.

The suit charges that the Louisville and Nashville Railroad and the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad have conspired to effectively preclude the TTI companies from transporting bituminous steam coal from mines in the East Kentucky coal fields to the Ohio River for transfer to river barges. TTI had planned to service domestic electric utility users and foreign purchasers exporting coal through the Port of New Orleans.

TTI and its subsidiaries claim that they have been damaged by various actions of the defendants in refusing to effectively preclude the TTI companies from reducing its work force to a third of its previous size. TTI has also been forced to defer work on an originally planned 25 million ton terminal which would have employed more than 200 people because of its problems with the defendants.

One liquor and beer license will be sought by Clay and Kathleen Fryman of Route 1, Faring, and another by Bobby and Carolyn Bowlin. The Frymans live in Nicholas County but have a Faring mailing address. The Frymans own a business at Valley View Liquor Store and the Bowlins, at Ball Liquor Store.

One absentee ballot was voted in the Myers precinct, and is included in the total of 148 votes.

The dry forces in Nicholas County say they will continue to fight against the liquor vote in the Myers precinct. They insist that it is not lawful for one precinct in a dry county to vote in liquor and beer.

The appeals court says they will wait to hear this case until later in the month. David Stancil said, "I hereby give both sides time to file a brief if they want to."

## Your next phone bill will be higher

As a result of a ruling by a circuit judge last week, your next South Central Bell telephone bill will "probably" show a rate increase, according to Bell spokesman Tom Tucker in Frankfort.

Franklin Circuit Judge Squire Williams granted some temporary relief Thursday and said the bill is entitled to receive an \$4 million rate hike until the company's appeal of a Public Service Commission order is resolved.

The apparent effect of this order is that "we will start collecting this increase under bond, until the case is resolved," Tucker said.

"If the PSC rules against us, we will refund the money with interest," Tucker added.

The increase will amount to an additional 44 cents a month for single party residential service and 75 cents a month for residential two-party service.

Single line business phones will get \$1 per month increase and two-party business phones will have an additional \$1.28 a month tacked onto their bills.
