Senator Walter (Dex) Holloman, ranking Democrat on the Senate Agriculture Committee, has called on the administration to "change the course" on farm policy, and outlined a possible legislative agenda for 1983 that will urge members of both parties to support it.

Holloman's remarks came during a hearing on farm legislation in the Senate. He said that the administration's current farm policy is "outdated and ineffective" in stopping the severe downturn in farm incomes.

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Homestead exemptions increased for 1983-84

Commissioner William L. Coffey of the Department of Property Tax announced that the maximum possible Homestead Exemption on real estate owned by qualified persons over 65 years of age or totally disabled has been increased to \$15,000 for tax periods 1983 and 1984. This represents the maximum amount of value exempted from property tax on real property owned and resided in by a qualified person.

The amount of the Homestead Exemption is adjusted every two years to account for changes in the purchasing power of the dollar. It has increased from \$5,500 in 1973 to the current \$15,000.

While an exact estimate of the benefits of receiving this exemption cannot be quantified, a taxpayer who receives the full \$15,000 exemption during 1983 can expect to save about \$100 on their 1983 property tax bill in state and local taxes. There are an estimated 225,000 qualified occupants of this exemption at this time across the state.

Barkeley urges tobacco quota reduction. Agriculture Commissioner Allen W. Barkeley II, speaking at a hearing in Lexington on the 1983 tobacco quota reduction officials that the quota should be reduced by five percent. The maximum allowed by administrative order is 10 percent. The results of this USA decision to increase the quota led directly to the loss of some \$2 million to \$3 million to Kentucky farmers.
