Budget cuts hit employment services

Human Resources Secretary Grady Blumho said Thursday that federal funding cutbacks will force his department to "severely reduce" employment services to Kentucky's jobless and its employers.
The most recent cut involves funds for the Employment Service and Work Incentive Program. These cuts are retroactive to Oct. 1, 1981, meaning that the department will have to further reduce services to make up for money already spent.
"Although the full impact of these cuts is not fully known, we already know that we will be forced to close or substantially reduce many employment offices throughout the state,"

Bumper year for crops in state

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for 67 percent of the state's total production.
Yield for the Belt is estimated at 2,174 pounds per acre — up 187 pounds from 1980. Harvested acreage is estimated at 22,338 acres — up 37 percent. Type 22, 22 and 25 are grown only in Kentucky and Tennessee. Type 22 production totals 23 million pounds up 11 percent from 1980. Type 23 production totals 4.6 million pounds, up 20 percent. Type 23 production totals 13.2 million pounds, up seven percent.

Kentucky farmers produced an estimated 187 million bushels of corn in 1981 — a record high. The 1981 crop is seven percent above the previous record 174.7 million bushel crop of 1978. Yield per acre at 190 bushels is up 20 bushels from 1980 and just below the short of the record 207 bushel yields of 1978 and 1979.

Average harvest for grain totaled 1.89 million acres, up 20,000 acres from last year and the largest acreage since

1969. Farmers started planting corn in April but were delayed from early May until mid-June by wet fields. Some early planted corn suffered from field erosion and drowning. Corn showed a wide range in crop development during the growing season and late planted corn received snow arroyos, corn lover and Japanese beetle damage. Late planted corn needed a late frost to reach maturity.
Nature cooperated and the first state-wide killing frost did not occur until Oct. 20.
While corn production in Kentucky is estimated at 11.3 million bushels, an increase of 46 percent from last year, yield and harvested acreage are both up from 1980. The yield of 90 bushels per acre is up 20 bushels and harvested acreage at 155,000 acres is up 15,000 acres from 1980 and just below the U.S. corn production in forecast at a record high 2.6 billion bushels, up 23 percent from last year's drought-stricken crop and three percent more than the previous 1979 record high.

KPA opposes Folt/Reagan FOI proposal
The Kentucky Press Association unanimously passed a resolution on January 21 opposing the Folt/Reagan FOI bill in Congress.
The resolution, approved at the 29-member association's winter meeting in Lexington, states that the proposed legislation "would authorize broad new secrecy powers by federal, state and local agencies."
"The provisions of this ill-considered piece of legislation are so broad that one would believe that the ghosts of Abner Doubt and Adolf Hitler are alive and well in the nation's capital. The Congress should remember that Abraham Lincoln stated, 'Let the people know the facts and the country will be safe.'"

Fire damages county home

The home of Charles Masley received extensive damage as a result of a fire that broke out there last Thursday morning.
County Fire Chief Woody Wilson said that the fire on the Weststone Road was extinguished in time to save the house and contents, but that the west end of a double crop house was further delayed by the rain delayed wheat harvest.
Some late maturing beans were damaged by the Oct. 22 frost, but most fields had matured sufficiently to be harvested. Yield is estimated at 29 bushels per acre, up 17 bushels from 1980. Harvested acreage for beans is 1.79 million acres up 100,000 acres from last year.
The main soybean crop is estimated at 2.85 billion bushels, 13 percent more than the 1980 crop. The average yield per acre at 82.4 bushels is 47 bushels from last year.

State will repair Stony Creek bridge

Repair to a bridge on U.S. 60 that crosses Stony Creek in Nicholas County was included in a contract recently awarded by the state department of transportation.
The contract includes provisions for repair to eight bridge decks in Bath, Carter, Mason, Nicholas and Rowan counties.

M&M Services Co. of Paris received \$156,043 contract for the project. The company will apply overlays to the bridge decks, which protect the surface from weather and aging, and besides the bridge over Stony Creek, the contract specified repair for the following bridges in their respective counties:

Rowan County — The bridges over the C&O Railroad tracks and Triplet Creek near Blounton in U.S. 60.
Mason County — The bridge over the North Fork of the Licking River six

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
