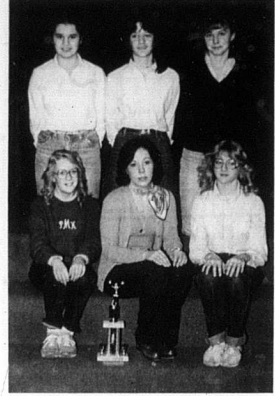

**Legislative week in review...**

An omnibus thoroughbred racing industry bill was approved by a House committee last week, amid increasing controversy over one provision of the measure that would allow off-track betting in certain areas of the state. Committee discussion of the measure continued as the week came to a close Friday.  
In the Senate last week, a measure was approved that would establish a four-year road plan for the state drawn up by the Department of Transportation and approved by the Legislature.  
A number of church groups — benefactors silent on the OTB question — began coming out in opposition to the measure, and their vocal protests should add a new dimension to the already-encore debate that has marked a lengthy study of the problem facing Kentucky's labored thoroughbred racing industry.  
Last week, for example, State Racing Commission Chairman William Sturgill urged the Business Organizations and Professions Committee to "go slow" on the OTB and tax-related measures contained in the omnibus bill.  
The House panel, however, ignored Sturgill's warning and passed the measure early.  
As now written, the bill would permit OTB parlors at six locations in the state and offer an \$1.8 million yearly in tax relief to Ellis Park and Latona Race Clubs. The two tracks in the state facing the most severe financial problems.  
The tax-relief proposal has also stirred controversy, with the Brown Administration warning of a more limited ballot of the financially-troubled tracks and others complaining about the potential loss of revenues at a time when the state is already digging and scraping for every additional dollar it can locate.  
Meanwhile, another controversial piece of legislation was encountering slow going in another committee as the week came to a close. The measure, which deals with reform of the state's nursing home industry, was the subject

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
