

Deputy Sheriff reports two county accidents

Two recent traffic accidents in the county were reported by one Deputy Sheriff Chuck Smith Monday afternoon.

The first accident took place last Sunday at the intersection of Upper Jacksonville and Cordele Roads and involved vehicles driven by Charles Jackson and Carlisle. (The new deputy's name, and Mark Hughes, 215 Millberry Street.

According to the deputy's report, Smith was traveling north on Upper Jacksonville when he met Hughes in the intersection traveling eastbound. When both tried to make a left-hand turn, they collided.

The deputy reported that both vehicles received heavy damage, and that the 1970 Dodge pickup belonging to Smith could have been totaled. No injuries were reported.

The second accident reported occurred at 30 East Thursday on U.S. 60, and involved two auto-mobiles. The deputy's report shows that a vehicle driven by Robert Smith, 4 Paris, was making a left-hand turn at 66, when a Ford egg truck driven by Harold Dyer Jr., 401 Hawkins Drive, Winchester, pulled out to pass and caused the accident.

Deputy Smith said that considerable damage was incurred by both vehicles. No injuries were reported.

County to receive cheese

Local Department for Human Resources officially announced Thursday that Nicholas County will receive 1,000 pounds of surplus processed cheese from the USDA for distribution to needy residents.

The cheese is part of over 215 tons of surplus cheese that will be distributed to the Department for Human Resources throughout the state.

New housing regulations for loans

Kenneth L. Seaton, Farmers Home Administration State Director, announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has changed its regulations to make it possible for more people to receive home loans through the Farmers Home Administration (FHA).

Seaton said the revised rules change the income eligibility criteria and make numerous changes to clarify and simplify operation of the agency's mortgage-lending program.

The FHA has a broad range of housing programs, including mortgage loans for single-family and multiple-family housing.

One of the major changes in the regulations is the elimination of a single, nationwide income eligibility level. Previously, only families with adjusted incomes below \$13,000 were eligible for FHA housing loans.

Income ceilings now vary by economic areas and are based on a percentage of the median income of the area. Low income is defined as 90 percent of the area median income.

Applicants who qualify for moderate-income loans will pay interest rates prevailing when the loans are closed. The current interest rate charged by the FHA is 13.25 percent.

"For low-income applicants, the agency provides 'interest credits' which reduce the amount of interest the borrower pays, sometimes to as low as one percent."

Using data developed by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the FHA now sets income eligibility limits in more than 500 economic areas throughout the nation. There are 13 economic areas in Kentucky, which correspond with the Area Development Districts.

Kentucky income eligibility ranges from \$7,000 to \$20,500. The low-income level at which applicants become eligible for "interest credits" ranges from \$1,500 to \$3,000.

The low-income level for interest credit assistance in Harrison and Nicholas County is \$3,000 maximum. Applicants who qualify for moderate-income housing loans may be awarded family income up to \$20,500 in Harrison and Nicholas County.

Interest rates charged on loans to moderate-income borrowers may be either FHA's established rate or HUD's, depending on the borrower's ability to pay.

Applications for new farm quotas accepted

Applications are now being taken at the local AISC office for new farm quotas for barley tobacco. The deadline for applications for 1962 is Feb. 16. Anyone interested should pick up an application at the AISC office between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The AISC office is located in the old armory building on East Main Street.

Below is a list of the eligibility requirements for new quotas:

- Applicant must not have any ownership interest in or operate another farm in the United States for which a tobacco allotment or quota for any kind of tobacco is established.
- Applicant can request establishment of quota only on one farm.
- Operator must own, or have readily available, equipment and other facilities necessary for the production of barley tobacco.
- Applicant must expect to obtain more than 50 percent of the current year income from farming, excluding
