# Auto thefts up in county

Violent crimes against people increased 4.3 percent in 1981 over 1980 figures, according to a preliminary annual report released by Commissioner Martin D. Campbell.

Of the four crimes included in this category, only the murder rate showed a decrease. Reported rape incidents increased 1.8 percent, robbery, 2.1 percent and aggravated assault increased 7.1 percent.

Murder decreased 3 percent in 1981 compared to 1980 figures. This continued a downward trend in the figures released last year showing a 4.2 decrease in 1980 from 1979.

Crimes against property dropped 4.4 percent overall in 1981.

Auto theft showed the biggest drop. Auto theft dropped 22 percent in 1981 compared to 1980. However, in Nicholas County figures showed auto thefts in 1980 were five, and 1981 were eight.

Breaking and entering decreased 4.4 percent and larceny ( theft other than auto) decreased 12 percent. Again, the preliminary annual report and county to county figures show an increase in these crimes in Nicholas County.

The preliminary annual report also included figures for each county in Kentucky.

# Farmers, take note

Farmers, will you have heard help this year? If not, remember that most farm workers are covered by Social Security and their wages must be reported.

If you pay a worker \$100 or more each wage in 1982, the wages are covered if the individual works for you 20 or more days and is paid on a time basis by the hour, day, week or month, that month too.

It is important to employees that wages be properly reported. Entitlement to and the amount of monthly disability, survivors, and retirement benefits depend on reported earnings.

A farm worker includes anyone who helps plant, harvest, process or deliver a crop. It also includes someone who does domestic work on a farm home or cooks for a farm crew.

As a farm employer, your responsibilities include:

(1) Keeping track of wages paid and taxes withheld for each worker. If you pay a time basis, note the exact days worked and wages for each day.

(2) Collecting and paying Social Security taxes. The rate for 1982 is 6.2 percent on earnings up to \$72,400. This tax is paid periodically, using Federal Tax Deposit Form 311, available from the Internal Revenue Service.

(3) Preparing the required forms. Early next year, you must complete IRS Form 941 (Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees) and W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement). These forms and instructions for completing them are available from any IRS office.

# State to keep 25% of money from food stamps

Kentucky will now be able to keep 25 percent of the money they recover from people who have received too many food stamps, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary C. Jarratt has announced.

"This is designed to encourage states to recover money that has been overpaid because of mistakes recipients make when filing for food stamps," Jarratt said.

It is estimated by the Department of Agriculture that this change, which was authorized by the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981, allows states to keep about \$1 million this fiscal year because of errors because of these mistakes, which are termed "non-fraud recipient errors."

Since January 1980, states have had a similar financial incentive to recover money overpaid to food stamp clients from program. States are already keeping 10 percent of the money they recover from food stamp recipients who have received too many stamps fraudulently.
