

School meal benefits change

The maximum income a family can earn and still have their children qualify for free or reduced price school meals will go up 10 percent on July 1.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary Jarrett said the change is part of the annual cost-of-living adjustment made by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to help people qualify for school meals.

Under the adjustment, the income limit for free meals eligibility, which is set by Congress at 130 percent of the federal poverty line, will go from \$10,900 to \$11,990 for a family of four. Eligibility for reduced price meals, set at 185 percent of poverty, will rise from \$15,200 to \$17,290.

The federal poverty line is \$5,960 for a family of four.

New KLRS established

The new Kentucky Statewide Lawyer Referral Service began operation on July 1, 1982. It will be operated under the direction of the Louisville Bar Association which has just successfully completed an 18-month Lawyer Referral and Information Service pilot project funded by the American Bar Association.

The new KLRS will be serving all counties in Kentucky Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. All clients will be referred to an attorney in their county who is experienced in the particular area of the law concerned and an appointment will be set up with the attorney for them by KLRS. KLRS will charge a \$10 fee for the first consultation with the attorney for a 30-minute consultation. If a longer consultation is needed, the fee will be \$25 per hour for a total of no more than half of the attorney's customary charges for a similar case.

This new service is supported by the Kentucky Bar Association in this effort to make legal services readily available to all citizens throughout Kentucky.

P&G takes legal action on "Satanism" rumors

The Procter & Gamble Company announced that it is taking legal action to stop the spread of rumors associating the company with satanism or devil worship. The company filed suit in Atlanta, Ga., and Pennsylvania against several individuals who are charged with "blowing the character" of Procter & Gamble by circulating "false and malicious" statements about the company and by calling for a boycott of its products.

Suits were filed against Mike Campbell in Atlanta, and against Mr. and Mrs. William J. Moore Jr. in Pennsylvania. In the suits, P&G charges that each individual made statements or distributed literature which stated that P&G supported satanism and that its trademark was a satanic symbol. They also encouraged others to stop buying P&G products, the company claimed. P&G is asking the courts to stop the individuals from further activity and for compensatory and punitive damages.

handout materials suggest this is more than rumor mongering by individuals. The company said P&G is investigating the possibility of additional lawsuits and that it will follow up aggressively on leads of organizations or individuals spreading the trademark in a circular design featuring a man-in-black figure looking out over a field of stars. It has been since 1960 and was officially registered in 1982. The early trademark was a simple mark of a star and a crescent moon. The figure evolved over the years to a formal design showing a man-in-black, a baby shoe, a queen's crown, an antique car show, a parade, Larry Proctor and the Nashville Express in addition to the Bobby Maxey Show. Potatoes are hot the world over

Produced in 130 of the world's 187 independent countries, one year's crop is worth \$10 billion at consumer prices, Rhoades reports.

Potatoes are fourth, after wheat, corn and rice, in world production, but because of multiple harvests, yield the most protein and food energy per acre. They are remarkably adaptable: potatoes grown from below sea level behind Dutch dikes to almost 14,000 feet up the chilly Andes and Himalayas.

This amazing vegetable is a South American native brought back to Europe from Peru by 16th-century conquistadors. Its own world conquest was complete. King Potato grows in more countries than any crop except corn.

Robert E. Rhoades, of the International Potato Center writes in the May issue of National Geographic: "The average annual crop (20 million tons) is valued at \$10 billion and supports a crop of four-lane super-highway circling the world six times."

Without potatoes, most production would slump and many "protein shy" crops, nearly half the world's crop, would starve.

Potatoes are also distilled into vodka and aquavit, processed into starch, paste, and dyes, and converted to alcohol. Researchers have shown that one acre of potatoes in one year's time can yield 1,500 gallons of ethyl alcohol, or potato "gasoline."

When Europe's potato crops fell in West Germany, genetic engineers have found two botanical cousins, the potato and the tomato, to produce potatoes and tospox. These hybrids, they hope, will someday produce food above and below ground, and share the best qualities.

In Asia and South America scientists are improving the commercial growing of potatoes by true seed.
