Interstate "swaps" are common among wildlife agencies, according to Bill Graves, director of the wildlife division of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "As a matter of fact," Graves adds, "I can't think of any wildlife we've acquired from other states without there being some kind of trade involved."

## WEDCO warns of rabies

Jim Hurrell, Environmental Program Coordinator, WEDCO District Health Department, issued an alert to residents of the county to be aware of the dangers of a possible rabies outbreak similar to those which are occurring in neighboring counties. Hurrell stated that in the past year, rabies has taken an enormous toll in the state from a standpoint of public health, agriculture and wildlife. Life insurance. The virus is so strongly established in Kentucky's animal population that there is no single county that can be considered free from the threat of a rabies outbreak, he said.

Hurrell noted that an understanding of rabies may be helpful in preventing a growing public health problem as well as a problem for individuals and their families. Rabies is a possible cause of encephalitis caused by a specific virus. Carriers of the virus may include any wild animal and wild domestic mammals and has been most frequently observed in dogs in the past, but since 1963 wildlife cases have replaced those of domestic dogs. Canine and feline rabies are extremely susceptible to rabies which is spread by saliva, feline and other wild animals and therefore even more difficult to control. In the non-antigenic state, rabies is not transmissible. The disease within humans are exposed when they try to treat or examine a rabid animal. It is urgent that farmers and the general public be aware of the common symptoms of rabies such as difficulty in swallowing or unusual behavior.

## City workers get raise

Carlisle city employees were granted an average nine percent raise at a special meeting held June 22 at City Hall. After a closed session lasting an hour and a half, city council voted the raise according to a schedule adopted during the closed session. "That means that not all city employees got nine percent," said Clerk Mary Tapp said, "but the average raises."
