### Fish here... Wouldn't that be nice

Wishful thinking is all that there was signs out on the lake directing you to good fishing spots.

Well, on several lakes around Kentucky there are such signs, and more are going up all the time. The signs, pictures of a fish approaching a boat, indicate where man-made fish attractors have been established. Currently, the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Tennessee Valley Authority are engaged in attractor programs.

Most attractors are made from brush piles anchored to the bottom. Brush is easily obtained and seems to attract fish better than "artificial" objects such as old tires or concrete blocks.

Some fishermen will fish attractor sites only during the spring crappie spawning season. However, studies have shown that attractors are effective fish coordinators virtually all year long. And it isn't just crappie that are attracted to brush piles. Expect to find bass, largemouth, channel catfish or just about any other species hanging in or around these sites.

Most of the attractors established by the fish and wildlife department cover about an acre of lake bottom and are marked at each corner by a buoy with the fish attractor symbol attached to it.

"One way to determine if you're over an attractor is to notice how often your boat gets snagged on brush," McClure says. "If you're not getting hung up, you're not fishing in the right place."

The problems of getting hung up can be solved by using a light wire hook coupled with fairly heavy line - around 20 pound test. A heavy pull on the line will straighten the hook and free you from the snag. Then the hook can easily be bent back to shape by hand and you're ready to continue fishing. This is an old crappie favorite, and it works every time you're fishing brushy areas with live bait.

### Dove, duck season announced

Dates for dove, woodcock and snipe seasons, as well as for an experimental early duck season, were announced recently by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Dove season will open Sept. 1 and continue through Oct. 31, with the second portion of the snipe season set for Dec. 1 through Dec. 31. The daily bag limit on doves is 12 and the possession limit, after two or more days of hunting, is 24. Shooting hours for doves are from sun until one-half hour before sunset, local prevailing time.

The woodcock and snipe seasons are scheduled for Oct. 3 through Dec. 3. Shooting hours for these species are from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. The daily and possession limits on woodcock is 3 and 10 and on snipe, 8 and 15.
