## Burley Co-op checks ready on June 15

 The Burley Growers Association Tobacco growers of this and other burley counties will share in a June 15 distribution of \$4,226,175.56 in "bonus" checks, earned as gains on the 1977, '78 and '79 crops.  
 The payments are covered by a total of some 20,000 checks being mailed from Burley Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association headquarters at Lexington. The checks are to farmers on final sale of pool consignments for '77, '78 and '79 crops taken under loan.  
 These final remittances on pooled tobacco for those years are in addition to money advanced to growers under prior supports at time of sale. Only 500 farmers who completed portions of their crop under loan in the current distribution.  
 As there were large burley crops in '77, '78 and '79, the checks are going to growers in virtually every tobacco county in Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Missouri — the states in which price supports are handled by the Association.  
 When the June 1982 distribution is completed, the total returns to growers in nine years will be an income of \$21 million over the 41-year operation of the price-support program.

## Kentucky exports donkeys to So. America

A recent \$13,000 export sale of four donkey stallions marks our continuing interest in finding export markets, large and small, according to Agriculture Commissioner Albert W. Barkley.  
 Barkley said Armando Herrera bought the four jacks to produce males for use on his large cattle ranch in Venezuela.  
 "Often, a relatively small sale can be a springboard to a bigger one," Barkley said. "This is a good example. Now, not only does Herrera expect to come back for more jacks, but he is also interested in our cattle and thoroughbred sales."  
 Barkley said that when department personnel learned of these interests, they invited Herrera to the North American International Livestock Ex-

 had been installed in 1961 and the type of pipe that was used in those years just wasn't designed to last as long as it had.  
 The engineers said that the new pipe would not be metal, but would be polyethylene, since it does not rust but can handle the pressure needed.  
 "Let me tell you something," Vandalingham told the great review team. "It's a matter of how you have to roll out of bed at 3 a.m. to fix a gas leak when there is always the danger of an explosion."  
 Vandalingham said one of his greatest worries was that escaping gas would find its way inside sewer pipes which might then allow the gas to go into someone's basement which could possibly cause an explosion.  
 "You must also understand that the community of Carlisle is made up of a lot of low income people and retired persons," Mayor Hughes said, "which means that we can't afford all this

 "undetermined" amount of cash. That robber was caught.  
 "The FBI reported to me they had had 13 bank robberies in the Louisville district in the last year," Andy Hadley told the Mercury. "Of those, ten were solved, and in two of the cases the robbers got cold feet and ran out before they got any money. Only one case is still unsolved."

## Kenilworth insurance banned in Kentucky

Kentucky Department of Insurance Commissioner Daniel Briscoe announced that he has issued orders halting Kenilworth Insurance Co. operation in Kentucky because of the firm's insolvency financial conditions.  
 Briscoe issued a two-part order: the first revoking Kenilworth's certificate of authority to do business in the state; and the second revoking the appointment of the 100 agents licensed statewide to sell insurance for the company.  
 The commissioner said that all current policies will be cancelled as of
