The presentation of audit reports to the fiscal court is the final step in the audit process. A letter to the Mercury James Graham said.

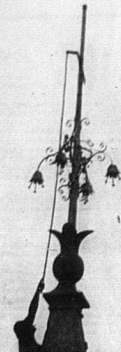
The letter also said that the auditor's office was adopting a new procedure for notifying the local news media in each county of the audit process.

Maysville makes National Register

The heritage division of the Kentucky Department of the Arts has received notification from the U.S. Department of the Interior that five sites in Kentucky have been listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Downtown Historic District of Maysville, located on the Ohio River in Mason County, contains 160 buildings and includes the historic commercial core of the town. Many buildings contain features unique to Maysville, such as the stepped gable and side-incorporated are late Victorian commercial buildings. Federal rowhouses and the Greek Revival courthouse.

The Henry Vogt Machine Co. Shop in Louisville is an outstanding example of turn-of-the-century industrial, utilitarian architecture in Louisville. The company is also important as a major innovator in the artificial iron-making industry in the U.S.

St. Paul's German Evangelical Church at 211 East Broadway, Louisville, was constructed as an outstanding example of the Gothic-Revival style architecture.

St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church at 180-88 West Market Street, Louisville, was listed for its historical significance as the first school founded in the United States by the Xaverian Brothers. The building, constructed in 1863, has additional interest as one of the few churches in Louisville in the Romanesque Revival style.

Home in Oldham County, The Carpenter South House, located near Brewertown, was also listed. Built about 1820, it is one of Oldham County's best preserved examples of frame construction. The brick nogging employed in the construction of the residence is an uncommon feature not frequently found in Kentucky.

The National Register is administered by the National Parks Service of the Department of the Interior, and is the official list of historic properties recognized by the federal government as worthy of preservation for their significance in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering and culture. Listing in the National Register provides consideration in the planning for federally assisted projects and eligibility for federal tax benefits.

VA offers new mortgage

Veterans Administration guaranteed Graduated Pay Plan 1 Mortgage (GPM) are now available with lower downpayments for new home purchase.

The new program is part of the Veterans' Disability Compensation, Housing and Medical Insurance Benefits Amendments passed by Congress last year.

Under the GPM monthly payments are lower for the first few years than the corresponding monthly payments on a traditional mortgage for the same amount. In a GPM mortgage a portion of the interest due on the loan each month is deferred and added to the principal balance of the loan. This is done during the early years. In a traditional mortgage all the interest and a portion of the principal are scheduled to be paid each month.

On new homes the downpayment with a VA GPM may be as low as 2.2 percent of the sales price or reasonable value of the property.

Watch out for phony bills

"Even small businesses pay many bills each month. Because of the volume of the bills, a business may happen to mistake pay an unattached or 'phony' invoice," says Attorney General Steven L. Beahler. "A phony invoice is a bill for services or supplies which has not been rendered, or a solicitation which looks to be an invoice."

Solicitations which appear to be invoices often arrive after a representative of the billing company calls a business after asking questions about the business's supplies and service procedures. Many times the company representative will misrepresent the company for he or she wants to sell a representative to a company that the business has dealt with before. Any solicitation which could be mistaken for an invoice is required to have the words "This is not a bill" printed on its face in easily readable type.

Most phony invoices charge for services or supplies which were never authorized or delivered. Larger businesses with separate accounting departments are particularly susceptible to this kind of description. Close communication between receiving and accounting departments is necessary to avoid being taken by phony bills.

Before paying a suspicious bill, compare it to the purchase order for that invoice and check each invoice for proper signature, type of product, number of units, price per unit, total cost, and the date of delivery. If the invoice does not contain the correct information or you "This is not a bill" printed on its face in easily readable type.

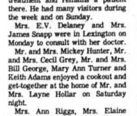
