The Carlisle Mercury editorial page was judged the best in Kentucky during the 1982 Kentucky Press Association spring contest, held in Florence, Friday and Saturday.
A first place plaque was presented to Mr. and Mrs. Warren Palmer Jr. at the awards presentation held Friday night at the Travelodge Inn.
In addition, the Mercury also won five other awards in judging among newspapers with 3,000 or less circulation.
A third place award was given for what the judges called "neat layout, with good use of contrasting bold and light headlines and good organization."

This category was typographic. The society page received a second place award and another second place was given to the Mercury for nice reproduction in the local news picture category.
The Mercury also won two awards in the display advertising category. The Mercury finished in a tie for second place with the Todd County Standard.

In describing the Mercury editorial page, the judges called it "neatly the best weekly editorial page in Kentucky." The judges said the ambidextrous editorial of Oct. 22, 1981 was superb.
