**Secure your home before vacation**  
Summer is a busy season and the Kentucky State Police is asking vacationers to secure their homes before leaving on a trip, said KIP Commissioner Marvin L. Campbell.  
Beginning a home against thieves is a lengthy process: home burglar proof windows and doors; store or remove valuables; and make your home look occupied.

Replace hollow doors with stronger solid wood or metal doors. Install "bump-resistant" deadbolt locks on entrance doors. If there is a window within 40 inches of the door, install a lock which requires a key for both sides. When the house is occupied, keep the keys handy for emergency exit.  
Install screws or framing nails in the back edge of the door and drill opening holes in the door jamb so the closed door can't be removed even if the hinge pins are taken out.  
Lock windows and secure sliding patio doors with a lock or bar. Install a padlock on garage doors.  
Maintain an inventory and photographic record of household goods and keep this information in a safety deposit box. This can be a great help if the items are stolen or destroyed.  
If you are going to be away for an extended period, store smaller valuables in a safety deposit box. Other valuables should be removed with an identification number.  
Your area state police post or a local police department participating in Operation Identification can loan you an engraver. Operation ID warning stickers are also available for placement on entrances to your home and on the engraved items.  
After securing your home and marking valuables, don't take those precautions by "advertising" your absence either through the local paper's social news or through the appearance of your property.  
Ship delivery of mail and newspapers. Make arrangements to have the lawn mowed and sidewalks swept. Ask a trusted neighbor to check on the property and to occasionally park a car in the driveway and adjust window shades.  
Connect a lamp to a timer. A radio television could also be connected to a timer.  
A final note: call the state police post or a local police agency and let them know you will be away from home.

**Berea Crafts Fair**

Craftpeople planning to take part in the 1982 Berea Craft Fair scheduled for July 24-25 should be reserving space with Berea Craft Enterprises Inc., 416 Main St., Berea 44015.  
The popular craft fair, held each year at Indian Fort Theater, draws over 100 crafters from Appalachia and the Eastern United States for a three-day celebration of the crafts heritage and a festive outdoor musical performance.  
Berea's first craft fair was held on Berea College's commencement day in 1937 and is commemorated in a mural in the Berea Post Office.  
The fair will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday through Sunday, with an admission charge of \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for children. In Kentucky there are 47,000 veterans of the almost 15-year war.  
The Better Business Bureau of Central Kentucky has issued a warning to all area residents who are considering purchases of starter kits, or something like that. But it all means that you pay the company money to work for them - and that's backwards.  
A typical advertisement for a work-at-home promotion promises "\$256.00 weekly, guaranteed. Work two hours daily at home." The guarantee, Cookin' points out, does not generally apply to the earnings, but only to a refund of the application fee if the work is not satisfied. "The problem is that you

can't always find the company to get your money back. These people can go through the business quickly and set up under a different name and try to get your money again."  
An example is a San Antonio, Texas operation which was the subject of a False Representation order issued by the U.S. Postal Service in June of 1980.  
By September of 1981, the man behind the San Antonio promotion was advertising in a Central Kentucky newspaper under a different name with a Kentucky, Texas, address.  
"Many ads," states Cookin', "which promise hundreds of dollars for a few weeks' work are simply lures for the advertiser. No actual employment exists, instead you'll be sold information on how to run the same kind of ad and try to rip off someone else."  
"These promotions all seem to have one thing in common," said Cookin'. "They require you to pay before you begin. Payment is usually returned in good faith deposit, registration fee, purchase of a starter kit, or something like that. But it all means that you pay the company money to work for them - and that's backwards."
