Sheriff reports accidents

Accident reports on file in the Nicholas County Sheriff's office show three traffic accidents that occurred in the county over the past week. One resulted in injuries and extensive damage to the vehicles involved. The first was a single-vehicle accident on U.S. 190 near the bridge. Friday night around 9 o'clock the driver of a 1971 Ford Mustang, Model 11, hospitalized overnight in the Nicholas County Hospital. The accident report said Barker was creating the Lower Jackson Road when he passed the right side of the government near the intersection with Carpenter Pike. Barker's car then traveled approximately 150 feet before going back across the road and over an embankment. The car took two road spikes before flipping over on its top. Barker was hospitalized with unspecified injuries. Randall Tate, a passenger in the car, was not injured. A second accident report on file told of a mauling that involved auto drivers on Paul G. Utzinger, Route 1, Dardula, and Linda Soper, Route 1. According to the report, the accident took place on the Lower Jackson Road and around 11:30 a.m. Saturday when Isham was rounding a curve and struck Soper's neighborhood. Sheriff Charles King said that both vehicles involved were traveling west on the road. Both Soper and Isham were taken to the Nicholas County Hospital for minor injuries sustained in the crash. A minor accident on the East Union Road was also detailed in a report in the Sheriff's office. The report stated that a vehicle driven by Charles McDonald, Route 2, backed out of a driveway in front of a vehicle driven by Paul Houser, Route 2. The accident occurred shortly after 6 p.m. The vehicles involved suffered only "slight damage." There were no injuries.

Minor accident on East Main

A minor traffic accident on East Main Street Saturday afternoon was detailed in a report by City Patrolman Jim Cox. According to Cox's report, the incident occurred when a driver driven by Michelle J. Hawkins, 508 East Main Street, struck a stop driver by Willie C. Jefferson, Route 2. Cox's report said that both vehicles were traveling west on Main when Jefferson cruised over into the left-hand lane and "ran back across" when Hawkins attempted to turn left at the "Y" of the Turn Restaurant, her vehicle struck Jefferson. The report said "very little damage was done to either vehicle." There were no injuries reported.

AG LAND STUDY COMPLETED

A copy of the final report of the Agricultural Land Study and Policy Commission is open for public inspection at each of Kentucky's 121 conservation district headquarters.

The report, which includes recommendations aimed at slowing farm land conversion to nonagricultural use, was prepared by a committee headed by Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. The governor created the committee in February 1979.

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Legislative week in review...

The General Assembly's every-day routine resumed last week, with the Senate approving a congressional redistricting plan previously passed by the House of Representatives.

The 343 vote brought this year's redistricting drama to a close, since state legislative and senatorial districts had already been redrawn and signed into law in recent weeks.

Although reapportionment is always controversial, this year's action was accompanied with little of the rancor common in past years.

One portion of the congressional plan approved by the Senate Tuesday is the 4th District, which includes the area from the Kentucky River to the Ohio River.

The congressional redistricting bill now goes to Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. for his signature. The governor has already signed bills dealing with state legislative reapportionment.

One other major piece of legislation was approved by the Senate last week, and it too has House approval and is ready for action by the governor—a bill which drastically changes the state's prevailing wage law.

The 40-year-old law, which sets minimum wages for many types of minimum wage contractors must be approved in exactly the same manner as it has House approval and is ready for action by the governor.
