City looks at lines

"A letter was drafted and sent by the
Mayor last Friday to the Farmers Home
Administration, District IV,
Lexington, outlining the Administration
of the City to accept for finan-
cial assistance the FRMA Public Recrea-
tion Lease program, as well as state
and HUD black grant money.

The third issue which was brought to
Council's attention by Mayor Hagans,
was a request for a pre-writing program, in
one which has been discussed many times
in the past. That is the East End Sewer
and Water Project. This involves water
and sanitary sewer extension to serve
residents of Liberty Heights, part of
East Union Road, and Shopton Hill
improvements. Several years ago a survey
was made by sending out question-
naires to the residents in those areas,
to find out 1) if the residents
wanted the extension; 2) what a \$700
hook-up fee would be charged; 3)
what the service rate would be; and 4)
that assessment would be the same as
other city customers; and 4) that assess-
ment would be 48 percent of the
residents responding were in favor of
the project at that time.

Council voted to investigate the
project and the present interest of the
residents.

Hansell again addressed Council on
the possible funding for the extension:
with customer assessments at \$700,
totaling \$60,000.

Possible commitment from Nichol-
as County Fiscal Court (made at the
time of the survey) for \$10,000. The
Council hopes to review this commit-
ment with the Court, and hopefully

work out a joint agreement.
-- HUD CDBG (Community De-
velopment Block Grant), \$25,000.
-- FRMA (Farmers Home Admin-
istration Lease of \$20,000.)
-- Total of these sources is \$450,000,
which would cover the cost of the
extension.

Another like in gas rates is store
for Carlisle residents, as explained by

raised their rates in the City two
