The 37th annual state meeting of Future Homemakers of America was held on April 24-25 at Executive West in Louisville with approximately 1,000 members and advisers from over the state attending. (See pictures elsewhere).

The theme of the meeting, "FHA/HERO—Youth Power Unlimited" focused on helping members and advisers develop their own power potential and gain many ideas to take home to strengthen their chapters over the state.

Highlights of the meeting included a special presentation by the state officers followed by the keynote speaker, Mrs. Audrey Carr, State Director of Home Economics.

On Friday afternoon, 11 concurrent sessions gave help to members on issues and concerns of living in today's world. A banquet on Friday evening featured Laura Ladd of the Lane County Chapter who had about her exciting summer in Japan as a representative of Future Homemakers of Japan.

Fourteen scholarships in the amount of \$500 and one in the amount of \$600 were presented to 15 outstanding FHA/HERO members who plan to major in home economics in a Kentucky college. Shari Jamney, president of the Nicholas County Chapter, received one of the scholarships.

Special recognition was given to honorary members, decade of service advisers, advisers serving 20 or 30 years, and those advisers retiring.

Friday ended with a "Western Whoop-De-Do" which featured the Clear Creek Choppers and John Cloyd of Versailles.
