For many camps, staying in cabins with other young people and adults is their first experience in group living. They learn a lot about getting along with others," Mrs. Wilson said. "Getting to know other people, sharing fun and learning with them offers valuable lessons in interpersonal relations for the camper."

Informal training in citizenship and leadership is an added benefit of 4-H training.

Kentucky 4-H camps will be participating in the federally-funded Summer Food Service Program for Children, which operates under guidelines similar to those of public school food service programs. The program enables the camp staff to hold down costs while most facilities can afford to send their children to camp, according to Mrs. Wilson. The fee is \$25.

Like all 4-H programs at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, the Cooperative Extension Service, the 4-H camping program is open to any youngster between the ages of 9 and 18 regardless of race, color, sex, handicap or national origin. The deadline for registration is June 2. For information on the camping program, contact Sharon Wilson at the County Extension Office, Box 112, Carlisle, Ky. 40302-2112.
