Kentucky Afield

What does a Bourbon County bar oak have in common with a Boyle County blue ash tree? They are two of a group of nine Kentucky trees unique in their status as national champions, whose status is recognized by the American Forestry Association's 1982 Register of Big Trees.

Each year the AFA compiles an updated Register of Big Trees and this year's list includes the following Kentucky national champions, whose status is determined by a panel (not based on circumference, height, and spread of the crown). The trees are listed according to species, county where found, circumference at 4 1/2 feet, and height.

Boyle County, 114' bar oak, Bourbon County, 117', 140' bar oak, Lexington County, 28', 92', 104' oak, Lexington County, 174', 134' swamp white oak, Marshall County, 277', 140' sandstone, Davie County, 170', sycamore, Estill County, 90', etc.

To give you an idea of the size of these trees consider the Casey County Ohio buckeye which is taller than a 12 story building. Or consider the fact that it would take seven men, each six feet tall, to reach around the Estill County sycamore. Early settlers sold of sycamore trees which could shelter more than 30 men and it is apparent that Kentucky can still grow them big.

A yellow buckeye which was 173' around and 140' high and a persimmon with a circumference of 74' and a half feet have reportedly been killed, even though they remain on the official list. Four trees currently being considered for nomination include a lightning aspen, slippery elm, striped maple and a pear tree. Following are the two champion list. This would bring Kentucky's total to 11 champions.

The blue ash, pin oak, and swamp white oak all have their champion status with trees in Indiana, Illinois and Michigan. It is also interesting to note that Kentucky has a champion hickory, usually associated with Ohio, while one of the oak-chestnut Kentucky coffee trees is located in Ohio. The other tree are found in Michigan and Pennsylvania.

While one might suppose these champion trees would flourish only in places inaccessible to man, the fact is that many of them are right under our noses. The hike goes for champions yet undiscovered, simply because we have taken for granted. The champion

is right on one of the main thoroughfares in Owensboro, Kentucky's third largest city, and is a local tourist attraction.
