### County buys road roller

An emergency called meeting of the Nicholas Fiscal Court on Thursday, May 13, the court voted to purchase a new road roller from a Louisville company at a cost of \$29,000.

It was explained that the old roller was incapable of being fixed, which meant that the road roller was needed right away, because this is the road fixing season and "time does not permit overruling for bids." The law allows the court to do this under "emergency conditions."

Judge Hesse stated that three roller dealers had been contacted and the best replacement was a 1981 Ferguson four tire roller from Construction Machinery Corporation of Louisville.

Regular sessions of the Fiscal Court on Wednesday, May 19, Rose Hesse of the PVA office appeared and said her office did not have the resources to over the

The lower lease payments would allow the hospital in Kentucky to give better service.
