Kay's Kitchen By Kay Fisher

Since I have had a request for information on chestnuts, I will give it to you. I will have plenty of time to decide before Thanksgiving if you want to try using them in dressing, or what you, for that last festive meal. Personally, I am glad chestnuts are available. They have been the market for some years because of a blight that killed the once plentiful trees quite a few years ago. First get the time to how to prepare the chestnuts so they will be edible.

TO SHAL BLANCH CHESTNUTS, prick all the flat side with place side in a pan with oil, using about 1/2 teaspoon for each cup of nuts, and bake in a very hot oven (450 degrees) about 20 minutes. Water that they do not burn. When cool enough to handle, remove shells and skins with sharp knife. Or cut side in each nut, put in heavy frying pan, mix with oil for just out shells and shake over for about 10 minutes.

TO BOIL CHESTNUTS: Blanch and simmer, covered, in boiling salted water to cover, 30 minutes, or until just tender; drain. Mash, chop or rice and season with salt, pepper and butter. Allow 1/2 pound of chestnuts to make 1 cup.

CHESTNUT STEFFING FOR TURKEY 4 cups chestnuts (prepared as above, halved, riced) 1/2 cup butter 1 egg 2 cups bread crumbs 2 tablespoons chopped parsley 1 cup chopped celery 2 tablespoons chopped onion Cream and/or turkey stock Salt and pepper to taste Prepare chestnuts as above and combine with rest of the ingredients. The amount of cream and stock depends on how moist you like the dressing.

TURKEY AND CHESTNUT SALAD Use 1 cup diced turkey, 1 cup chopped chestnuts, 1 cup chopped celery, 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped, and 2 stuffed olives, chopped. Mix in dressing with mayonnaise.
