Moorefield home burns
County farmers responded to a call from the Moorefield area on Saturday, Nov. 13, at about 4 p.m. but were too late to save a home occupied by Buddy Watkins on the gravel road. The house and its contents were a total loss. Cause was believed to have been a defective chimney. Owner of the house is Vernon Darrell of Mount Sterling.
Two grass fires were fought Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 9 and 10, by county firemen. One was reported at about 4 p.m., four miles west of Carlisle on U.S. 60 at Westgate Farms. It was a fire on the old Bob Clark farm, caused from burning logs in an open field.
Farmers also responded at 1 p.m. the day after, four miles west of Carlisle on the Hartsville Road at the A. L. Hutchison place. Trash had been burned in a corn field.

Driving costs increase

The Blue Cross Automobile Club-AAA reported that the average cost of owning and operating an American compact car rose 8.2 cents — to 34.1 cents per mile — during the third quarter of 1982.
This new average was caused by slight increases in gasoline prices and insurance costs, AAA said.
The average cost per mile is determined by combining variable and fixed costs. Variable costs amounted to an average of 8.2 cents per mile and include gasoline, oil, routine maintenance and tires.
The report also includes automobile operating cost figures for regions of the country. New England was the most expensive, at 34.8 cents per mile. The Midwest was next expensive, at 34.6 cents. Costs in other regions were: West, 34.4 cents; Great Lakes, 34.1 cents; Mid-Atlantic, 34 cents; Southeast, which includes Kentucky and Southwest, 33.8 cents.

IRS interest rate change

Effective Jan. 1, 1983, the annual interest rate charged by the IRS on tax underpayments and paid on overpayments will decrease from 20 to 16 percent. The rate on the underpayment of individual and corporate estimated taxes will also be 16 percent.
Periodic changes in the IRS interest rate are provided in the Internal Revenue Code, as amended by the recent Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982.
The new rate was set on Oct. 13 and was based on 100 percent of the average prime interest rate for September 1982.

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To: The Citizens of Carlisle

The following are the facts concerning revenue to the sale of alcoholic beverages:
An Attorney General's opinion, based on KRS 139 and the case of George Wiedemann Brewing company vs. the City of Newport ruled that cities are confined to license fees as a source of revenue.

In a survey made a few years ago, it was found that approximately 1/10 of one percent of the city budget of Owensboro, Kentucky came from license fees for the sale of alcoholic beverages.

KRS 243, Section 17 states a regulatory license fee on the gross sales of alcoholic beverages may be levied but that tax may only be of sufficient percentage to cover the excess costs resulting from the sale of alcoholic beverages. The amount of license fees must be subtracted from the amount of taxes the city may levy. There can be no additional revenue from the sale of alcoholic beverages.

Concerned citizens should also be aware of the results of the latest Gallup Poll concerning the effects of alcohol on the American family. As reported in The Lexington Herald on November 16, 1982, this poll reported:
"That alcoholic abuse troubles one in three families in the United States and is considered a major national problem by more than 80 percent of the population."
"That forty-seven percent of those surveyed felt that heavy drinking can lead to the use of other drugs."
"That seventy-nine percent of those surveyed believed that alcoholism was a disease that should be treated in hospitals."

Facts About Alcohol Sales in Carlisle

- * According to (KRS 116.025) any person living in the city who is 18 years of age or older may vote on the alcohol referendum. Persons will be allowed to register until November 24, 1982.
- * According to (KRS 241.060) there will be only 1 package liquor shop per 1500 people. Beer and wine may be sold in existing super markets. (KRS 242.129) states that restaurants, motels and hotels may serve beer and wine if they can prove that 50% of their income is from food sales.
- * According to (KRS 244.070) it is illegal to sell alcohol to persons known to abuse their families by the purchase of alcohol.
- * According to (KRS 244.080) minors under 21 years of age may not purchase beer, wine or liquor under any circumstances.
- * According to (KRS 244.020) it is unlawful for any person to be publicly drunk or publicly display alcoholic beverages. This law applies to both wet and dry communities in this state.
- * According to the A.B.C. Board, based on sales per capita on a statewide basis, Nicholas County will sell approximately \$225,000 per year on alcohol alone. That is not taking into account surrounding dry counties. The average spent is \$132.000 per capita per year.
- * According to the Kentucky State Chamber of Commerce, Nicholas County's overall retail sales will increase by 20% per year.
