

### Booth named chairman by Don Mills

Carlisle resident Kimball Booth has been named county campaign chairman for the Democratic Congressional District Committee by Don Mills.

Booth, an expatriate for International Business Machines in Lexington, has played an active role in the Nicholas County Democratic Party organization.

Declaring that his county campaign leaders will deliver a 400,000-vote Democratic victory in November's general election, Mills said, "I am honored that these individuals will be leading the effort on my behalf."

"They share my concerns," Mills continued, "about the unfairness of the Republican policies, which have been so ardently supported by my opponent."

These county leaders share my belief that our citizens should have representation which is fair, rational and honest. They believe the 400,000-vote margin is a representative margin which belongs to the people he's supposed to serve. They want a government that will be the result of Democratic conviction.

Booth will replace the bridge over Hinkson Creek on KY 37, Paris-East Union Road, at the Bourbon-Nicholas County line.

The bridge is part of the state's five-year construction program. Bids for the project will be taken Sept. 17.

Carlisle's tree monument

East Union Road to be resurfaced

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet will resurface KY 130, East Union Road, from 1.3 miles northeast of KY 37 extending northwesterly a distance of 2.5 miles.

Bids for the project will be accepted on Sept. 16.

The road is part of the state's 1982 resurfacing program. Transportation Secretary Frank Meier has received increased funding for the program to \$9 million.

"We're going to backstop one mile in an area of the 20.00 miles of state maintained roads," he said. "We're protecting the investment Kentucky has made in its roads."

Last year's Transportation Cabinet resurfaced 1,100 miles of roads for \$40 million.

### Hunter trials at Far Cry Farms

A five fall day in the country is scheduled for Sunday, Sept. 26, at Far Cry Farms near Carlisle, when the Licking River Hounds host their annual hunter trials beginning at 9 a.m.

A tradition that started long ago, the trials were held each year before the beginning of the fall hunt season. All the local farmers and land owners were invited to a breakfast and show at the farm of the show.

There will be a total of 10 classes, four of which perpetuate trophies are awarded. There is also a Fall class (no jumping), a hand team class and a children's class. The course simulates the conditions found by horse and rider in the actual hunt field. The judge for this year's show is Charles H. Lovell III from Lexington.

Entry fees for all classes is \$6 in advance and \$8 the day of the show. A breakfast for exhibitors and guests will be served starting at 11 a.m. but reservations are needed.

The show starts at 1 p.m. at the clubhouse grounds and everyone is invited to come. From Carlisle go on Highway 1 toward Cynthiana and the farm will be on the right.
