**Kay's Kitchen**

If seems I have been clipping hints and ideas for years. Though this would be a good time to pass some of them along to you. Hereafter, they are only ideas, and you may already have thought of them. If you have some to add to the collection they would be welcome, and I'm sure helpful and pass them along.  
— Before trying to substitute one ingredient for another, be sure to consider similarities in texture and taste.  
— Unflavored yogurt may be substituted for sour cream. Top creamed cottage cheese blends in a blender until smooth may also be used for either yogurt or sour cream. There is a slight difference in the flavor of each, but all three have a tart, and thick creamy consistency.  
— Still in the dairy line, increased cottage cheese can be substituted for more expensive ricotta cheese. Not as good, but works fine, unless you are a purist.  
— If you want to substitute fresh herbs for dried, use three or four times the amount.  
— To make substitutions in recipes rather than purchase an item called for:  
To make sweet milk sour, add 1 cup tablespoon vinegar to 1 cup sweet milk and let stand five minutes.  
1 cup milk equals 1/2 cup condensed milk plus 1/2 cup water.  
1 cup milk equals 4 tablespoons powdered milk plus 1 cup water.  
1 tablespoon oil plus 1/2 tablespoon of shortening are about equal in flavor and texture to 1 ounce of chocolate.  
— In place of frosting on a cake, spread with jelly, then sprinkle with chopped nuts or coconut.  
— 1 egg yolk may be used for 1 egg.  
— 1 cup bread crumbs equals 1/2 cup cracker crumbs.  
— 1 slice of white bread (regular slice) yields about 1 cup soft bread crumbs or cubes. It also equals a cup of toasted crisp, and relieves too fine crumbs.  
— 1 cup macaroni or spaghetti will equal two cups when cooked.  
— Larder vegetable oil may be substituted for a small amount of butter. Do not use paper on cookie sheet.  
Put in freezer. When frozen hard you can use to pack or packaging.  
Overmeasure place on top of dessert and help with frosting.

The couple is residing in Elliott Court.

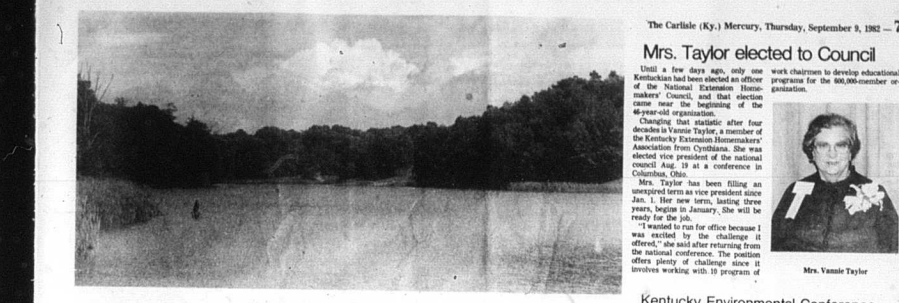

**Child restraint device has proven its worth**  
An auto-safety seat has been credited with saving the life of a two-year-old Grayson County boy, according to state police in an investigation.  
"A car driven by the boy's mother, caregiver Debbie Severinsen of Clarkston, Ark. lost pavement, flipped over and a half mile and landed on its side in a ditch. Mrs. Severinsen was treated for facial injuries but her son, 2, who was in a child restraint device, was unharmed.  
The accident occurred on Aug. 29 on Highway 289 South near Leitchfield. Trooper Ed Webb, who investigated the accident, said he believes the safety seat, which was properly fastened, kept the boy from serious injury or death.
