

Deaths Don Mills and Sixth District Demos to gather in Frankfort

Don Mills and Sixth District Demos will gather at Frankfort, Friday, Sept. 24, at an evening rally for their Congressional candidate Don Mills.

Stated to begin at 8 p.m. at State Democratic Headquarters, the event will bring together some of Kentucky's leading Democratic political leaders in a show of support for Mills. The rally will feature live bluegrass music and free hot dogs and drinks for all who attend.

"I am looking forward to seeing supporters and campaign workers from our 14 counties," said Mills. "The rally is going to be a celebration of the impending return to Democratic representation for the Sixth District."

Among the many prominent Demo-

crats who have been invited to participate in the Mills' rally are members of Kentucky's Democratic Congressional delegation, Senators Wendell Ford and Walter "Doc" Holladen, and Congressman Carroll Hubbard. Governor Marshall, William Natcher and Carl Perkins are expected to be on hand, unless Congressional business necessitates their staying in Washington.

Former governors and gubernatorial hopefuls also will participate in the Mills' rally. Democratic Governors Bert T. Combs, Ned Breathitt, Lawrence W. Wetherby and Julian M. Carroll are expected to attend. Lt. Governor Martha Laine Collins and Louisville mayor Harvey Stone, as well as unannounced candidate Grady Stumbo, have been invited too.

Houseburn reported

About one-fourth of those farmers responding to the Kentucky Crop and Reporting Service say they have some houseburn.

Severely among those reporting ranges from 40 percent reporting light houseburn to 36 percent reporting moderate and four percent heavy.

Eighty-five percent of the barley crop is cut, the reporting service says, slightly ahead of the pace for the last two years and the five year average. Some losses standing in the fields were damaged by heavy rains of last week. Some farmers are using heat and air movement in the barns to dry and keep houseburn to a minimum.

Availability of barn space varies by locality, with virtually no open barn space reported in this area.

8th Grade 4H elects officers

The eighth grade 4H group named their officers recently, and Max Kelly Howard was elected president. Mike Brookshire was elected vice-president. A name was also decided upon for the group and it was "Kelly's Heats."

Other names considered were "RT's," "Good Heads" and "Kelly's Angels."

The group filed out enrollment forms and Mrs. Sharon Wilson told us about the barley in October.

"It's 4H," reporter Jay Phillips said, "you get to make 4H projects and go to nice places. You hear about people around you. The group that you get in is one that you'll learn to, and as you learn you have fun."

tors last week the board voted unanimously to reassess its stand against any reduction. The action was taken in response to a letter from USDA asking the Association to reconsider its earlier position.

In the five-cured states the Secretary trimmed the average loan rate 1.4 percent to \$1.99 per pound, from \$1.79. Five-cured is in surplus and reportedly will place about 20 percent of this year's crop under loan. Stocks on hand were 400 million before the market opened.

"But barley is not in trouble," say the Lexington-based pool's officials, for loan stocks have been sold out for over a year.

Farm Bureau complains

Price supports on the 1983 crop of barley would be below the current level, Kentucky Farm Bureau President Ray Mackay has told the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Mackay's recommendation was contained in a four-page letter he filed with the agency Sept. 14. Mackay, citing figures which indicate that barley stockpiles are near an all-time low level, said any move to reduce price supports this year would constitute "a serious breach of faith with producers."

He said tobacco farmers "willingly and courageously offered to underwrite the price support program," based on the assumption that loan rates would not be tampered with unless certain grades of barley became a burden on the system.

"I feel compelled to remind you," Mackay noted, "that farmers agreed to, and Congress enacted, a no net cost program, not a program to ensure that the barley crop associations stay permanently empty."

Cemetery gets reply on 'mystery dog'

Recently, in a feature story with Mr. John Frederick of the Courier-Centinel, he said that he did not know the history or origin of the iron dog on top of a gravestone. This past week, Mr. Frederick received a letter from a St. Petersburg, Fla. lady regarding the dog and we reprint the letter here with Mr. Frederick's permission:

"I would like to say I believe the Curlew Cemetery is the most beautiful there could possibly be any place. My mother must have taken me there when I was very young as I cannot remember my first visit there. I grew up visiting that dog, so would like to tell the story as my mother told me through the years. I never tired of hearing it as a little girl.

"It isn't a dog's grave. The story was, Mother heard it, that a boy from Cincinnati is buried there. He was 11 and understood it, about 11 or 12 years old. His mother could not afford a stone for his grave. The dog had been the kind of a decoration at her home, the boy had liked it, so she had it sent to Curlew and put on his grave and the dog had stood there since. I wonder how many people have talked of it being so beautiful. This past week, Mr. Frederick said, 'when it was first put there, after you entered the gate, the first thing you saw was the dog.' So if we judge by what my mother's age would be, and the number of years I have been around, the dog must be 100 years old or more maybe more.

There are two more monuments that are outstanding to me, though even with my love for the cemetery, I failed to see and appreciate the site. It's beautiful. I hope to look for it the next time I am there.

I would also like to point out the other I would have known since my childhood, each with an interesting story.

Rainfall above normal lately

The Kentucky Crop and Reporting Service says rainfall recorded at both Lexington and Mayville is above normal for the last four weeks, but still below normal for the year since April 1.

The Lexington reporting station measured 3.98 inches of rain for the four weeks ending Sept. 13, about a quarter inch above normal, and at Mayville station reported 4.67 inches, about one-half inch above normal for the last four weeks.

For the year since April 1, however, rainfall is still below normal, about four inches below normal at Lexington and nearly three inches below normal at Mayville.

Total rainfall for the year since April 1 at Lexington was 16.73 inches and at Mayville station reported 18.84.

Gas rates go up after all

Although Columbia Gas of Kentucky has announced that it will not seek a rate increase "at this time," the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission has announced that it will allow Columbia to pass on utility increases by its suppliers which will total nearly 14 percent.

"The FERC," Hopkins said, "should have Columbia Gas of Kentucky to renegotiate these old contracts, now that prices are lower."
