

Unemployed may draw additional insurance

Beginning April 1, 1983, unemployed workers in Kentucky may be eligible to draw from a \$14 additional weeks of unemployment insurance through the Federal Supplemental Compensation Program, extended by Congress last year. This is in addition to the regular benefits for which they qualify.

Congress extended the Federal Supplemental Compensation benefits for six months, if through Sept. 30, 1983. Included in this extension is a provision for "phased-out benefits." Under that provision, claimants will have not exhausted their entitlement before Sept. 30, 1983 may be eligible to receive up to 50 percent of their remaining entitlement after that date.

The Division of Unemployment Insurance in the Cabinet for Human Resources estimates that approximately 27,000 unemployed Kentucky workers may be eligible for the latest Federal Supplemental Compensation extension. The division will notify potentially eligible claimants by mail within the next week.

Prune — don't top — those trees

Ask an arborist or a landscape specialist the most common mistake made in maintaining a pruned tree. The answer will be the "topping trees."

The method of controlling tree growth, also called heading, deboning, stubbing or topping an older tree, is not a recommended practice, according to Dr. Weston Danwell, University of Kentucky College of Agriculture horticulturist located at the Research and Education Center in Princeton.

"Topping destroys a tree's appearance by eliminating its natural form," said the Extension specialist.

"During the winter, these topped trees take on a very unnatural appearance, looking more dead than alive. And in the summer, the small tree heads on massive trunks look strange."

Aside from the appearance problem, the horticulturist points out that topped trees have a much higher risk of wind and low damage than do trees in their natural state.

"This is because the regrowth on a topped tree doesn't develop the strong, continuous wood that normal branches do. It regrows in a weak, brittle manner. The outer layers of the tree and is very weak," said Danwell. He added that many times, the stubs do not develop any regrowth and die.

"This leaves a dead snag in the tree that could fall, and is, therefore, a hazard," he noted.

Topping rarely helps

Danwell says that the large cuts associated with topping rarely heal properly. Often, decay and insects enter the tree where these cuts are made and can result in death of the tree, a hollow tree or a less vigorous tree that will be slow to recover from the severe cuts.

"If none of these other problems occur and we look at topping from a purely logical point of view, it does seem that we are damaging our trees by removing leaf area," said Danwell. He explained that leaves are required to provide food for the tree, and if we reduce the leaf area by 50 percent, we can't expect that tree to make a healthy recovery when most of its energy must be used to replace the lost leaf area.

Danwell said only the most vigorous trees survive topping, and some die soon after topping and some have their tops die several years later.

"Isn't there ever a need to reduce tree height? That answer, of course, is yes."

"A tree sometimes becomes too large and gets in utility lines, blocks views or grows into buildings," said Danwell. Some trees also become hazardous because of unhealthy conditions.

In these cases, the horticulturist recommends that thinning-out pruning cuts be made to reduce tree height. "Thinning out cuts reduce the weight and spread of a tree while retaining its shape," he explained. Branches are pruned back to lower laterals that are at least one-third the size (diameter) of the portion of the tree being removed. Size can be maintained most effectively if you prune at a place in the tree that reaches normal acceptable size," noted the Extension specialist. "If you delay pruning until the tree is much larger than wanted, pruning will be more difficult, cuts will be harder to make and almost all cut and removed growth will be encouraged."

Growth that is not needed without greatly affecting tree appearance by stopping or reducing nitrogen fertilization and irrigation.

Danwell says if a tree must be continually topped to keep it out of lines, the most sensible alternative is to remove the tree and plant one elsewhere or plant a smaller tree in the same location.

"We don't expect everybody to get out there and do their own pruning," said Danwell. "But we would like for people to be informed and know about alternatives to topping."

An additional alternative to tree care and pruning is available at county Extension offices.

Tax returns required from estates

A taxpayer's death does not necessarily mean that a federal income tax return is no longer required in his or her name. The Internal Revenue Service said.

If the taxpayer dies before filing a 1982 tax return, his or her spouse or personal representative must file and attach a return for the decedent if a return is required. A personal representative can be an executor, administrator or anyone with legal responsibility to take care of the decedent's affairs. If a return is not required, but the taxpayer had tax withheld, a return should be filed to obtain a refund, the IRS said.

If the surviving spouse did not refile before Dec. 31, 1982, a joint return can be filed. Also, a joint return can be filed if the taxpayer dies in 1982 before filing a 1982 return.
