### Farm program

from production as payment for participating.  
According to Cozner, the base acreage enrolled in the program includes 79 wheat acres, and 1,277 corn acres.  
Provisions of the acreage reduction program call for a combined 10 percent acreage reduction and a 10 percent paid land diversion for corn, and a combination 10 percent acreage reduction and five percent paid land diversion for wheat.

Farmers participating in the acreage reduction program were also eligible to participate in the payment in kind program offering an additional 10.30 percent of their base acreage to receive payment in kind. Farmers could also bid to not plant any of their crop for 1983, and receive a percentage of their farm yield of the commodity as payment in kind for not growing any crop.

### Hardy Road to be resurfaced

The state Transportation Cabinet will resurface three miles of KY 128, Hardy Road, in Nicholas County this summer.

The cabinet will resurface the road from the Harrison County line to KY 92 and KY 9.

The project is part of the Transportation Cabinet's 1983 resurfacing program for Nicholas County.

Bids for the project will be accepted April 15.

During the past two years the cabinet has reduced the resurfacing cycle on state roads from an average of once every 25 years to once every 15 years.

### Greyhound will keep Cynthiana, Paris route

The state Transportation Cabinet has denied Greyhound Lines' request to abandon three Kentucky routes and has approved the abandonment of 19 other routes throughout the state.

Greyhound will continue serving the routes along KY 12 between Winchester and Hazard, along U.S. 400 between Mt. Sterling and Salersville and along U.S. 27 between Lexington and Covington.

Of the U.S. 27 route, Commissioner of Vehicle Regulation Timothy Hoban said, "Greyhound has presented no proof that alternative service is available. Several towns along the U.S. Highway 27 route will be virtually without access to public transportation monthly, Paris, Cynthiana and Paducah."

Last month a hearing examiner for the Transportation Cabinet had recommended that service be maintained on the two Eastern Kentucky routes along KY 15 and U.S. 400 citing a "significant demand for public transportation services" in the area.

In preparing the final order, Hoban said that the U.S. 27 route from Lexington to Covington "generated the second greatest amount of revenue for all of the routes which were sought to be abandoned," indicating a significant demand by the public for the route.

Greyhound had sought the abandonment of 22 routes based on their unprofitability. The company had stated that service would continue to be provided via paratransit interstate type highways.

A public hearing on the proposed abandonments was held Jan. 18.

### FCIC sales closing date is April 30

"Tobacco, corn, grain sorghum and soybean sales for new applicants will close April 30," announced John Spyer, District Director for Eastern Kentucky Federal Crop Insurance.

Spyer also said that all policyholders should be aware of the change in the 1983 policy that requires tobacco growers to give their agent notice of damage at least 15 days prior to their beginning of tobacco harvest, if any unit is damaged to the extent it is probable after the completion of warehouse sales. Insured farmers should also keep soil tests, fertilizer receipts and chemical receipts such as herbicides and insecticides in order to show good farming practices if a loss on a unit does occur.

"We're looking against unavoidable losses, not poor farming practices," Spyer said.

**WITHHOLDING MAIL**  
**CAUSES BACKLOG**  
"Mail opposing the 10 percent withholding tax on interest income has accumulated what neither snow, nor rain, nor heat in a storm of right failed to accomplish," U.S. Rep. Larry T. Hopkins, R-Ky., last week announced. "And, that is the worst complication of the post office's rapid change of the massive amount of mail still pouring into the U.S. Congress — most of it in opposition to last year's law which mandates the withholding of interest income — mail going into a representative's office is delayed approximately two weeks, Hopkins said."

"This unprecedented volume of constituent mail is literally flooding the House of Representatives and it's causing a backlog of delivery of incoming mail," Hopkins said. "This is only the second time in 10 years that a backlog has developed in the House. A request for temporary mail handlers has been put in, but until the mail situation stabilizes, we won't even see the letter written today until two weeks from now. I hope everyone will be patient throughout this mail crisis."

"As for the status of the 10 percent withholding act on interest earnings, I cannot hold out much hope that the law will be repealed. Ways and Means Chairman Dan Rostenkowski, who controls committee legislation, and Speaker Tip O'Neill have both said they'll thwart any attempts to repeal the law. I voted against it in the first place and, if I get the chance, I'll do it again. The opposing legislation to get it off the books and I've written Cong. Rostenkowski a personal appeal."
