Various surplus food go to low-incomes

Kentucky will receive at least four kinds of government surplus foods to distribute to low-income people during May. The United States Department of Agriculture will send limited quantities of rice, powdered milk, corn meal and butter to the state. The commodities will be distributed through area development districts following procedures used in the past to the state's indigent population. In addition, Kentucky which has distributed approximately 10 million pounds of commodity cheese during the last few weeks.

Operation Blue Mold control suggested for Kentucky growers

Kentucky growers will be hearing a great deal about Operation Blue Mold control. This national campaign is being conducted in all tobacco states to encourage growers to follow a four-step program designed to provide full season protection from this serious disease in both plant bed and field. The goal of Operation Blue Mold is to encourage effective treatment to prevent disease occurrence and subsequent crop damage, reduce the chance of resistant race development and help break the chain of the costly blue mold causal agent within the next two to three seasons. Kentucky growers are encouraged to carefully follow each of the four steps described below. Step 1. Control blue mold in the plant bed. Especially all growers applying Ridomil at the rate of one quart per acre (about four teaspoons per 100
