 date to move ahead with construction. The \$1.9 million that the fiscal court first agreed to furnish for the project was the contents of the savings account. The county had earmarked for the existing water line.

Grant explanation
 The grant document gave away in part, "The 1981 door-to-door socioeconomic survey, funded by seven instances of disease which were thought to be associated with the sewage situation. They involve the families of John Cleaver (hepatitis), Wanda Carpenter (hepatitis), Terry Fruebeck (typhoid), Larry Truesell (hepatitis), and Maura Kohnenfelder (hepatitis)."

In a 1981 letter, Dr. William E. Davis, WTKO Health Director health officer, stated, "I have knowledge that the present system of sewage disposal by individual septic tanks has long proved to be unsatisfactory. Many of the septic tank systems have failed. The public health is threatened and sanitation conditions abound. The proposed plan would not only solve the public health problem, they would allow for the connection to the public sewer for the Community Action building and the abandonment of the 'packaged' sewage treatment plant that presently serves that building."

Collected sewage would be conveyed to the Carlisle municipal sewage treatment plant for treatment and subsequent discharge to Brushy Fork Creek. A sewer line, under the jurisdiction of the Kentucky Division of Water (April 1981) underlines the extent of the sewage tank and package sewage treatment problems. A letter from the local Chamber of Commerce echoes the concern of the need and desire for the sewer line to contain the growth and development of the area and to "bring" and "bring" carried from substituting a "scratch and build" sewage treatment and sewerage plant which stands in the yards and runs across driveways and down streets and into the creek. A sample of the written comments of the affected residents must suffice. Quotes from a few of the community survey forms include: "sewage is everywhere" "odor in the summer," "only one septic tank serves seven trailers," "terrible," "have to have rats (septic tank) pumped every year," "neighbor's septic tank overflows in our yard," "odor from across the street and sewage runoff from neighbors on both sides," "septic tank runs down driveway and into the creek," "water comes to the top of the ground around house," "septic tank is not suitable for septic," "backyard is not suitable for children to play in and the garden is not fit to grow vegetables," "sewer flows, cannot walk through the yards," and "just the smell makes it impossible to sit outside."
