Kay's Kitchen

Spring time is salad time, and a good filling vegetable salad served with a "one dish meal" will make a satisfying dinner. Make salad salads will make the task even easier. Here are a few to help you get started.

- VEGETABLE SALAD**
 1 cup boiling water
 1 teaspoon salt
 Dash of red pepper or hot pepper sauce
 3 tablespoons sugar
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 Combine all ingredients and stir until dissolved.
 Prepare and add:
 1 tablespoon grated onion
 1/2 cup chopped potato
 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
 1/2 cup shredded cabbage
 1/2 cup grated carrot
 1 cup chopped pecans
 Spin until well combined. Pour into a large glass dish. Serve when set. This salad keeps well and will serve 10 to 12.

- CONGEELED ASPARAGUS SALAD**
 1/2 cup cold water
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 Mix the above ingredients and bring to a boil. Dissolve 1 package of gelatin into the gelatin, set aside and let cool until it begins to thicken, then mix in:
 1 medium size can (not three) asparagus, drained
 1 small onion, grated
 1 small jar chopped pimento
 1 cup chopped celery
 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 Four large meals. Serve when set.
- SPRING SALAD**
 3 cups shredded carrots
 1/2 cup pineapple chunks, drained
 1/2 cup miniature marshmallows
 1/2 cup raisins
 1/2 cup dried celery
 1/2 cup mayonnaise, mixed with 1 cup lettuce
 Combine all ingredients except lettuce. Mix lightly. Chill several hours. Serve on individual plates lined with lettuce. Six servings.

Put in a greased quart size. Garnish with fresh lettuce and quartered tomatoes. Cherry tomatoes halved are nice to serve with this until home grown tomatoes are available.

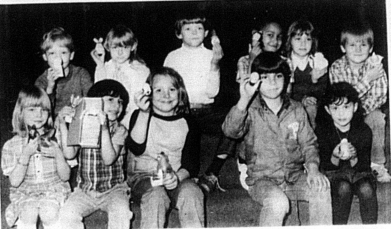

Nine ways to save time and get earlier tomatoes

- 1) Do not put plants too close together. Space them so that each plant has plenty of air circulation.
- 2) Place plant protectors or hot caps over the plants for the first couple of weeks. If tomatoes are grown in cages, clear plastic can be wrapped around cages for extra warmth and wind protection.
- 3) Start with fertile soil and healthy transplants. Buy plants that have experienced untroubled growth or grow your own.
- 4) Plant in a light, sandy soil that slopes slightly to the south. Heavy soils can be amended with sand and organic matter. In the absence of a slope, soil can be ridged and plants can be set on the south side of the ridge.
- 5) Apply a starter fertilizer when setting plants in the garden. These water-soluble nutrients give plants a boost when they are set into cool soils.
- 6) Do not put plants too close together. Space them so that each plant has plenty of air circulation.
- 7) Place plant protectors or hot caps over the plants for the first couple of weeks. If tomatoes are grown in cages, clear plastic can be wrapped around cages for extra warmth and wind protection.
- 8) Use black plastic mulch to increase the soil temperature a few degrees.
- 9) If organic mulches are preferred, apply them only after the soil has warmed.
