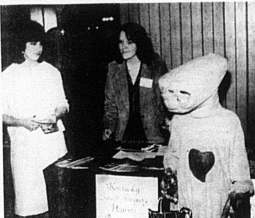

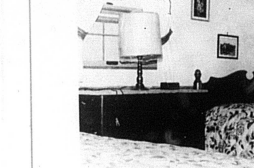

building to build. Water is obtained from an outside tank.

This was a family affair says Mrs. Gibson. Another neighbor's skills were called upon when the house was wired and since a stone mason could not be found in the Gibson cabin the job was done by the Gibson family. The cabin was perfectly preserved. Only one log had to be replaced, and it was found in Robertson County, says Gibson. Strangely enough the log fit perfectly and did not have to be recut.

After the house was completely gutted the job was to disassemble the logs. Mrs. Gibson, the former Marsha Hardin and Nicholas County native, enlisted the aid of her nephew, David "Pete" Hardin, and his friend and employer the top log, nothing would be left behind. Each log was weighed, and every piece of wood was inventoried.

Even though the Gibsons have no wish to build another cabin, they have no regrets about the hard work and vacation time spent on the restoration. They have heard someone to rebuild the cabin would have taken the meaning of the cabin machinery, but Mrs. Gibson, a U.S. Postal Service employee in Lexington, says, "I just wanted to get away from the telephone and the noise."

"We had a lot and a lot," adds Mrs. Gibson. "That's life at Cedar Hill" on Persimmon Ridge.

Perhaps the hardest task was re-creating the logs were re-cut and re-joined. Small rocks which were originally cemented over. As quickly as the cement would be applied it would fall out, but the job was so effective the cabin is heated with a single wood-burning stove.

The Gibsons made other changes to the house's plan. Originally the upstairs was accessible by a stairway, but the stairs were removed. Instead of a wood floor there is now a sleeping loft with a cathedral ceiling. From the open area over the downstairs hangs an impressive light fixture from a de-constructed Lexington estate.

Another change involved moving the fireplace to the rear of the house. This was possible because, unlike most log cabins, the original chimney was continued inside the house, rather than the outside. Also an enclosed back porch was not replaced.

"We didn't waste anything," says Gibson. Floorboards were used in the roof and remaining floor joists will be used in a split rail fence. In addition to the fence another future project will be landscaping the yard.

The outflow One of the most enduring features of the Gibson's home is the "outflow," such a term is indeed misleading. Rather than the proverbial "we-leave" this is a complete bath, including a glassed-in tub.
