

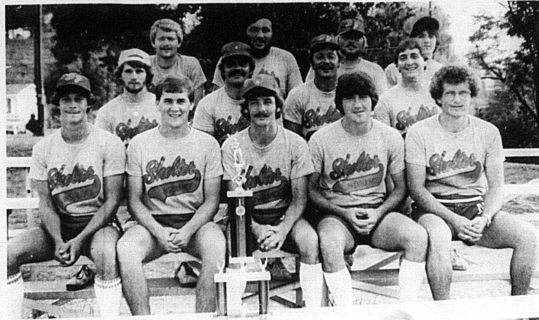

Jackets do well in scrimmage

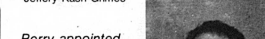

Drought causing plant loss
Drought conditions present for the last couple of months have taken their toll on crops and plants as well as on the livestock industry. The injury being inflicted now can continue to cause problems for trees and shrubs in years to come, according to Dr. Robert E. McNeil, Extension Specialist in nursery crops at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

McNeil says the problem may also show up as slow plant decline or an infestation of insects as a result of drought. New plantings are suffering more than normal, mostly because of lack of expanded root systems. McNeil said he explained that because of spring rains, many plants were not dried until late, and these plants were not able to establish themselves well enough before the dry weather arrived this summer.

This condition will establish itself as a year of more plant loss with a planted forest than occur in most planted forests that are also occurring with 1981 and 1982 planted stock which still tends to be large enough to have root systems to support them during severe droughts in upper soil levels. Large trees may not be suffering as much if their root systems are into soils of lower depths where water is available, according to McNeil.
