### McConnell leads fight against child exploitation

Jefferson County Judge/Executive Mitch McConnell visited Nicholas County on Friday to speak about the Kentucky Task Force on Exploited and Migrant Children and to rally support for local fingerprinting efforts. McConnell, who is chairman of the Task Force, spent his time in the county promoting a child fingerprinting program. "Hopefully, there will never be cause for a parent to use these fingerprints. But if your child does disappear, those fingerprints in your drawer or cupboard at home could play an important role in finding your child," McConnell said.

He added that every year "there are over 30,000 children abducted by strangers and 100,000 young people stolen by noncustodial parents across the country. Many of these young people are in prostitution

and pornography and drugs." McConnell said that kidnapping by noncustodial parents is also a real threat to a child's well-being. "If the courts did not give that parent custody, you can pretty much figure there was a good reason for that decision," he explained.

According to McConnell, the Task Force will be holding its seventh and final public hearing in Ashland in early September. "After that," McConnell said, "the group will issue a final report that will include its findings and a series of legislative initiatives it will recommend to help protect Kentucky's children."

### Gallows Hill road to be re-surfaced

The state Transportation Cabinet will accept bids in August to resurface 2.1 miles of roads in Nicholas County this year. The cabinet will resurface KY 108, Old Gilvin Road, from the Bourbon County line to the Bush County line, a distance of seven-tenths of a mile. In addition, 1.4 miles of KY 145, Galloway Hill Road, will be resurfaced from KY 29 to U.S. 60. Bids will be opened Aug. 30. resurfaced Sunday evening to halt water hauling sales, that there be no vehicle washing, that the laundrymat operate between the hours of 8 and 9 a.m., that individual users not water lawns, shrubs, flowers and gardens. The message is conserve water! The emergency called meeting was attended by Donald Hasey, president of Blue Grass Industries; Henry Peters, plant manager of Blue Grass maintenance engineer; Barry Madman, director of textile operations for Jockey International; Richard Pender, director of finishing for Jockey International; and Donald Elder, schools superintendent. The situation arose last Wednesday, Aug. 18, when the city's filtered water level dropped. Mayor Hughes called on Lexington television stations to get a message to Carlisle's water users to use care with remaining water — not wash cars, water lawns, gardens, etc. In general the public's response was good. Elder assured Council that he would see that water was conserved at the schools, and that approximately one-third of their normal usage could be saved by using soap plates in the lunch rooms, which would eliminate the use of dishwashing machines.
