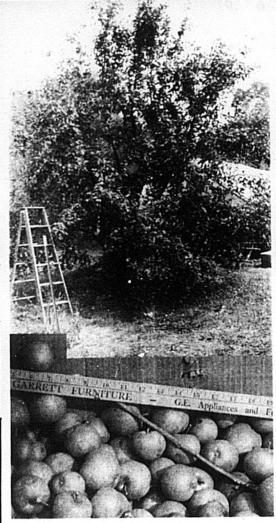

**NEW FEEDER GRADERS DISCUSSED IN LEXINGTON**

New feeder cattle grades which are determined by frame size and muscle are being discussed recently in Lexington in preparation for the Kentucky Beef Cattle Association (KBCA) fall sale. The feeder cattle sales began this month and continue through early December.

Prod Williams, developer of the grading system for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's experimental branch, and Skip Bevan, eastern area Market News reporter for USDA, conducted the program for KBCA graders, county extension agents from 16 counties and feeder cattle sales will be held and representatives of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture.

"Even though the state Department of Agriculture's Market News program has been reporting livestock prices by the grades since September 1980, the KBCA just began using the grading system experimentally," said Williams. **SPECIAL RESOURCE CENTERS TO OPEN**

**Supply-demand gap makes Ag jobs plentiful**

Job opportunities in agriculture are increasing at a rate that should exceed the number of ag graduates who want a job after graduation.

"A U.S. Department of Agriculture study predicted that the demand for ag graduates will exceed the number of ag graduates who want a job after graduation," said Dr. John Robertson, associate dean for instruction in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"This means young people entering agriculture colleges in '83 and elsewhere in the next few years will find more job opportunities than will be available to them," said Robertson.

"The demand for ag workers is being created, in part, by an unusually high number of agricultural scientists and professionals who are retiring in the next decade."

"Most of this group started their careers right after World War II and now are becoming eligible for retirement," said Robertson.

"A second cause for the increase in demand is a decrease in supply. The baby boom" population is moving past college age and the resulting decline in agricultural economics agriculture colleges had.

"In the past three years, enrollment in U.S. agriculture colleges has declined 10 percent and is expected to further decline an additional 12 percent in the next decade."

Robertson says that agriculture college enrollment would increase if more students would take a look at agriculture careers. They will probably find out there is more to agriculture than they thought, he said.

"Agriculture colleges train people for jobs other than the traditional soil science, food and fiber production jobs."

"Many people are surprised to learn about the wide diversity of disciplines encompassed by agriculture, including engineering, business and economics, and sociology, as well as the plant and animal sciences," said Robertson.

"Students who enjoy working with people will find a wide range of opportunities in management, planning, education and sales. And regardless of whether you like to work in small towns or large cities, there are opportunities for the agriculture professional," said Robertson.

**Water conservation pays in more ways than cash**

With indications of continued loss in the weather forecasts for Kentucky, officials of the state Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet are urging citizens to conserve water.

"At this point, there is an immediate need to begin voluntary conservation measures, especially in those areas of the state which are reaching critical water capacity," said Leon Strouder, assistant director of the state Division of Water.

"People in this state — Paris, Cynthiah, North Middletown, Harboursville, Middlesboro, and Painesville — should be able to cut water consumption by 10 to 20 percent without a great deal of difficulty or discomfort," Strouder said.

Citing National Weather Service figures showing that Kentucky received only one-fourth of the normal amount of rainfall during the month of July, Strouder said that state officials have been surveying community water supplies.

Voluntary water conservation measures suggested by the division of water include:

- Install a water-filled plastic jar in the toilet tank to reduce the amount of water used at each flushing.
- If you hear the sound of running water in the toilet tank, adjust the float valve or replace any faulty hardware.
- Install flow restrictors or water-saving showerheads in your shower.
- Eliminate leaks in sinks by replacing old gaskets.
- Install faucet aerators.
- Don't leave water running for long, shaving or brushing teeth.
