Social Security news

People receiving Social Security Disability benefits must notify Social Security of your condition improves. In addition, your case will be reviewed periodically to verify your eligibility for benefits. This review will be conducted at least once every three years unless the Social Security Administration determines a shorter or longer review period is appropriate. When you report or during a review you may be asked to discuss your condition with a Social Security representative. New medical evidence may be needed from time to time, and you may be asked to undergo a special examination or test. The Social Security Administration will pay a reasonable charge for medical examinations and reports it needs or requests. If it is determined that you are no longer disabled under the Social Security law, your entitlement will end. However, you will still get a benefit for the last month of your disability and two additional months.
