
Date of SS visit here is changed

## Kentucky company helps process surplus cheese

Cabinet for Human Resources officials have announced that 3.1 million pounds of federal surplus food will be distributed throughout the state in January, including some food processed right here in Kentucky. In addition to the state's allotment of processed food from the United States Department of Agriculture's commodity food program, 675,000 pounds of surplus cheese processed in Letchfield by the Bel Cheese Company will be given out to eligible low-income Kentuckians. Federal surplus raw cheese is processed by Bel Cheese under a memorandum of understanding with the Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources. "We worked out a way to process cheese here in the state because more raw cheese was available than the federal government could process, and we wanted to take advantage of the surplus for Kentucky people who are eligible and need food," said John Calton, commissioner of the cabinet's Department for Social Interaction. Kentucky is the first state in the southeast region to process its own federal surplus cheese, and the Letchfield company says the operation is going well. "This contract has been good for Kentucky and good for Letchfield," said Bel Cheese Production Manager J.B. Brown. "We've hired 23 additional people, we're meeting our delivery schedule, and the quality of the cheese is good."

Surplus food distributed in January will include butter, honey, cornmeal and instant dried milk, in addition to aged locally either by the Area Development District or the Community Action Agency.

## UK library gets grant to preserve newspapers

The University of Kentucky King Library has received a \$10,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to plan a program to access and preserve copies of Kentucky's newspapers by computer cataloging and microfilming.

"The grant will assist in onsite microfilming of the newspaper collections, historical societies and libraries," said Frank Levick, project coordinator who heads the program. More than 300 questionnaires have been mailed to publishers, libraries, colleges and universities, historical societies and museums — any place we think newspapers are kept," Levick added.

The library then expects the NEH to assist with funds for the microfilming of these newspapers in imminent danger of destruction but that several years down the road, Levick said.
