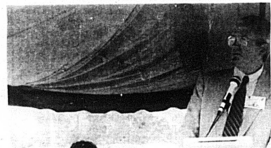

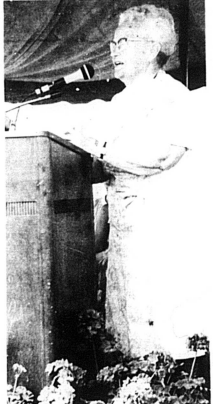
Breaking ground

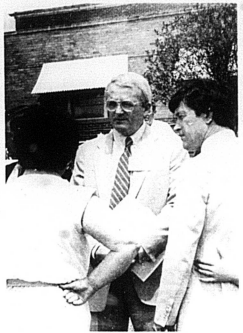
