Hudleston release

Congress is now on record opposing the sweeping sale by the administration of six million acres of national forest land, including some 300,000 acres in the Daniel Boone National Forest in Kentucky and more than 800 acres of the Jefferson National Forest in Pike and Letcher counties.

The "Sense of the Congress" statement, disavowing the proposal as contrary to the national interest was added to the supplemental appropriations bill conference report out last Tuesday.

Senator Walter (Dee) Henderson had initiated the Congressional action on the same day the Forest Service announced its plans last Spring. Last month, he and Senator Robert Kasten (R-WV) cosponsored a "sense of the Senate" resolution opposing the sale.

The resolution that quickly gained overwhelming support in the Senate, in the conference committee meeting last Tuesday night, House conferees joined in the battle, making it a "sense of the Congress" resolution. Hudleston was serving as a conferee.

The resolution states that sale of significant acreage of national forest lands is not in the national interest until such time as the Forest Service identifies the specific tracts, inventories them for public benefit values, provides opportunities for public review and discussion, and completes all necessary environmental assessments of such sales.

In a statement issued the day of the announcement, Hudleston denounced the proposal, saying "this administration seems bound and determined to plunder our national heritage to achieve ill-defined goals that I am not convinced even they understand."

Hudleston had early on expressed his suspicion that the Forest Service had been instructed by the administration to raise a fixed amount of dollars through setting off land, and had determined the "need" to sell certain parcels to meet the dollar figure. That suspicion was later borne out in testimony by the Forest Service before the Senate Agriculture Committee, on which Hudleston serves as the ranking Democrat.

Daniel Boone National Forest program lost

The Daniel Boone National Forest will implement a new personal use firewood program for the opening firewood gathering season. The objective of this program is to meet the needs of the public for personal use firewood harvested from the National Forest in a manner which will result in increased utilization of residual materials, meet land management objectives, and (2) be compatible with firewood marketing programs from adjacent nonforest lands.

Due to the increasing demand for firewood, it has become necessary to charge a fee to collect firewood on the Daniel Boone National Forest. The cost of firewood permits varies depending on access, type of material, and quantity but all Ranger Districts will have firewood available at the minimum permit charge of \$10 for six standard cords (approximately 12 cord-hold log pickup loads). Only in areas of poor access or isolated areas of low demand will free use permits be used.

Some free use permits will be issued by the District Ranger Offices. Due to the limited demand for firewood from National Forest land on that district, persons who want to harvest firewood on the Daniel Boone National Forest should plan to get it as soon as possible this year. Cold, wet weather later on can make roads muddy and slippery. Firewood needs time to dry out so it will burn better and give off more heat.

Visitors planning to cut firewood in the Daniel Boone National Forest should keep these things in mind: — A permit is needed. It can be obtained at District Ranger Offices.

— To simplify administration and control illegal woodcutting, firewood can be cut only from designated areas on all ranger districts.

— Individuals interested in harvesting firewood for sale to others can arrange to purchase timber by contacting District Ranger Offices.

— Inquiries and additional information can be obtained by contacting Morehead Ranger District, U.S. Forest Service, Box 10, Ruders Run Hollow, Morehead, Ky. 40351, phone 666-364-5624.

— When a permit is issued, personnel at the Ranger Station will give directions to the designated areas and answer any questions.
