Excess poundage carryover for burley discontinued

The excess poundage carryover program for burley and flue-cured tobacco will not be continued for the 1983 and subsequent marketing years. The program was reinstated for the 1982 crop only after having been in effect for the crop years 1977 through 1979. The program was discontinued beginning with the 1979 crop because it

stimulated over-production, with producers intentionally producing excess tobacco, and there was no provision in law for reducing the farm quota for the following year, even though some of the quota would be eliminated by pounds held in carryover. It tended to contribute to the rising costs of leasing quotas; large amounts of carryover depressed auction market prices; and over-production encouraged increased incidents of false identification.

James M. Davis, director of the Tobacco and Peanut Division, United States Department of Agriculture, ASCS, has been requested by Gov. Hopkins to be present to discuss the proposed rules with respect to the sale of burley tobacco quotas by persons other than individuals, as printed in the Federal Register on Friday, April 22.

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a \$92,240 contract for resurfacing in Nicholas County. Hinkle Contracting Corp. of Paris submitted the low bid for the project. The company will resurface three miles of KY 126, Hardy Road, from the Harrison Coffey line to KY 32. The project is part of the state's 1983 resurfacing program for Nicholas County.
