Senator Bunning calls for spending ceiling in forthcoming fall election

Senator Jim Bunning, Republican candidate for governor, announced the delivery of a letter to Lt. Gov. Martha Layne Collins, Democratic candidate for governor in the November election, when he addressed the Summer Convention of the Kentucky Press Association at the Lexington Marriott Griffin Gate.

In his letter, Sen. Bunning put in writing, "some direction which they would like to see" the gubernatorial campaign take.

In summary, these are the four points he made. First, he proposed a spending ceiling of \$1.5 million for each

Kentucky FmHA improves status of its farmer programs portfolio

Kendall L. Seaton, Kentucky FmHA State Director, has announced that good progress has been made throughout the state in reducing the number of delinquent farm loan accounts. Training meetings were held in January and February this year to familiarize personnel with proper planning and evaluating farm loan accounts and to consider alternatives of deferment, rescheduling and reamortization for each farm borrower on a case-by-case basis.

Seaton said Kentucky has a farm portfolio of approximately 10,000 borrowers and 22,000 loan accounts. Last year in December, Kentucky had a delinquency portfolio of 11 percent. In January this year, when most payments normally become due, the delinquency rate increased to 20 percent.

Seaton stated this percentage now has changed significantly through borrower payments and FmHA efforts and anticipates a six percent delinquent Farmer Programs portfolio on July 1, 1983. In addition, he said this percent-

age should go down slightly during the balance of calendar year 1983.

FmHA in Kentucky, Seaton said, is giving every consideration to borrowers who have made good faith efforts to repay their loans, but could not because of circumstances beyond their control, who have practiced good management; and who have property maintained property used to secure loans.

"Our first concern is to help the truly responsible farmer stay in business," Seaton said.

Seaton said that patronage should never be returned to state government and asked for a commitment from

candidates, including all campaign funds, "to prevent a perception by the public that election can be bought by a massive infusion of media dollars."

Second, he restated his May 20 challenge to a series of seven debates, one to be held in each of the congressional districts, "so that the voters may see on live television as we debate not only the issues of the campaign, but the problems and opportunities relative to state government that are important to that particular district."

Third, he agreed with "Governor Brown's position that patronage should never be returned to state government and asked for a commitment from
