## To The People of Nicholas County

I have been asked to give my opinion on the proposed legalization of liquor sales here in Nicholas County. In the eight months that my family and I have lived here, we have been impressed with the friendliness and pride in this community. As a physician, I am keenly interested in giving care and information that will provide the highest standard of health for all. Consequently, I believe we would be making a mistake if we voted our community "wet".

According to recent studies, alcohol abuse is a major health problem for about one in twenty-five persons in this country. 50% of all traffic deaths, homicides and suicides are alcohol-related. Over sixty different diseases are related to alcohol abuse, resulting in a ten year decrease in life expectancy for the average problem drinker. The annual national economic toll created by these problems is estimated to be \$31 billion. Studies clearly indicate that children raised where alcohol is abused are much more likely to abuse alcohol when they grow up.

Finally, if liquor does become legal locally, I believe alcohol abuse in the community will undoubtedly increase. Of the five Kentucky communities where I have lived, the number of alcohol-related problems I have witnessed seem disproportionately greater in those places where liquor sales were legal (and the others all had plenty of bootleg liquor available).

Based on those experiences and the above facts, I believe Nicholas County stands to lose much more than it could gain by voting "wet". Progress can be made here without accepting the ironic emphasis our society has placed on alcohol.
