You may need to buy more Girl Scout cookies in order to enjoy these cookie desserts. You will be holding the Girl Scouts and yourself with these quick and easy desserts.
NO-BAKE DATE-NUT BOLL.
12 Girl Scout oatmeal cookies, crushed in 1/2 cup chopped dates (about 3 oz.)
1/2 cup instant marshmallows
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup unsweetened whipped topping
Take about 1 cup of crushed cookies, add dates and nuts. Combine remaining 1/2 cup of cookies with dates, marshmallows and nuts in a bowl. Add whipped topping and mix well. Grease hands with butter or margarine. Form mixture into balls, pressing very hard. Sprinkle the 1/2 cup marshmallows on a plate of waxed paper. Roll date, nut mixture in crushed or finely crushed marshmallows. Roll date, nut mixture in waxed paper and chill several hours. (This delicious dessert improves with age.) Store and serve with additional whipped topping if desired. See recipe.

Sloane supports schools

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Harvey Sloane has announced his support for a strong back-to-basics approach in Kentucky schools, for getting more students into high schools, and to place more Kentuckyans in managerial jobs after they finish high school. Sloane announced his position in a comprehensive 17-page plan for improving Kentucky schools that was released by his campaign recently. Sloane pledged to increase general-fund support of education and to require the demonstration of minimum basic skills competency evaluation of students as a condition for admission to the fourth grade into middle school, into high school, and for graduation from high school. Sloane also repeated his intention to make computer literacy a goal of the instructional program and for more attention to be focused on the nurturing of gifted and talented students. Sloane also said he will explore a system of competency evaluation for teachers and for increasing teachers' salaries and benefits as a way of making the profession more attractive to Kentucky's best minds.

Announces coal policy

Saying that coal must be transformed into a clean form of energy if the industry is to thrive again in the Kentucky, Gray Shumate, Democratic candidate for Governor, released his coal policy statement. "Right now people perceive coal as a dirty, nasty, bulky product," said Shumate. "Our challenge is to lower the environmental impact of coal in order to increase the demand for it as a fuel." Shumate said that the coal industry must have the resources to develop the technology to produce clean coal. "However, state government can take the lead and make a difference," he said. "As Governor, I will direct the Energy Cabinet to concentrate its research efforts to develop technology that can produce environmentally clean coal." Shumate cited the progress of coal technology Corp. in Lexington in manufacturing a clean-burning coal product. The firm has developed a patented process by which they produce coal so small to be used in boilers into big form. The product has drastically reduced the level of smoke associated with burning coal.
