Hopkins announces Kentucky's top deer counties

Although the complete tally for last year's deer season isn't in final form, Hopkins (64) and Butler (58), Franklin County earned sixth place honors with a harvest of 667 deer and Logan is number seven with 581.

Madison and Henry counties, each with 505 deer, tied for eighth place. Breckinridge hunters killed 481 hunters around 19 in come home with venison for the first time.

All of these "top" counties were in harvest zone two, where hunters could take antlers deer on the last day of the 10-day gun hunt. Under 1978 regulations recently approved by the Fish and Wildlife Commission, Breckinridge, Franklin, and Henry counties will be moved to the bucks only zone three. This change means that a "one day" on alternate years will be sufficient to stabilize deer populations in these counties.

An indication of how Kentucky's deer herd has grown in the last several years is that the total harvest from our top ten counties (actually 11 counties because of the tie of 400 deer or more) was the statewide harvest from open counties in 1978, which came to 3,926.

Another indicator is the increase rate, which in the past few years has climbed from around 19 percent to 18.3 percent. That means for every 100 hunters around 18 come home with venison for the first time.

22,000 lose unemployment

Some 22,000 unemployed Kentuckians are being notified by mail that they will no longer be eligible for extended benefits after March 19. The notification is being mailed to those eligible for the federal-state extended benefits program, which provided 11 additional weeks of payments to the unemployed.

Commissioner John Culline of the Department of Social Insurance says that the program contains a "trigger" that determines when a state is eligible for the benefits extension. "The program 'triggers' on when a state's insured unemployment rate has dropped below the 'trigger' level," Culline pointed out. The Commonwealth has passed the "trigger" point.

Approximately 22,000 persons in Kentucky will be affected, although some may be eligible for unemployment benefits under another federal program. Culline said that all of the 22,000 recipients have exhausted the regular 30 week benefit period. "However, eligible persons who will not fall off the extended benefit program may have their claims covered by the federal supplemental compensation program, which provides up to 16 weeks in benefits," he explained.

Sloane names education chairman

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Harvey Sloane has named state Rep. Kenny Harper, D-Bartonsville, as chairman of Sloane's Elementary and Secondary Education Task Force. Sloane also named state Sen. Ed O'Connell, D-Pointsville, as vice chairman of the committee, which will help Sloane to develop his platform for the improvement of Kentucky schools if Sloane becomes governor.

"We wanted an distinguished group as we could find for this important task, and we believe we've got one," Sloane said.

Harper and O'Connell will lead a group that includes nine school superintendents, four school board members, two school administrators, 17 active or retired teachers, and one college professor.
