**Kentucky Afield**  
Watch those fishing rules

Since Kentucky's basic fishing regulations aren't difficult, most avid anglers pretty well know them. But watch out because there are exceptions to the rules on certain lakes. These exceptions to statewide size and creel limits originated with the need for specific management of certain waters. While a statewide regulation may work adequately for 99 percent of the commonwealth's fishing waters, a particular body of water may need special treatment.  
Huntington size and creel limits are one of the most powerful local fisheries regulations here for managable fish populations. Researchers with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources expect that more and more of these exceptions will crop up in the future as biologists identify specific problems at different lakes or streams.  
In some cases, the exception allows a more liberal harvest than the statewide rule. At Lake Malone and at Shanty Hollow Lake, for example, the size limit on black bass has been removed completely. At Grayson Lake in eastern Kentucky, the daily creel limit on crappie has been removed.  
In these cases, the problem is too many fish. At Malone and Shanty Hollow, the problem is too few.

**CHANGES IN REGULATIONS**  
The Nicholas County Community Action Center has announced a schedule of Thursday, March 31, on packing up cheese. Hours are 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.  
Finally, two lakes have increased size limits for black bass. At Grayson Lake, a 15-inch minimum size limit should lead to larger bass and more production in the overpopulated crappie there. And at Kentucky's newest lake, Taylorville, a 14-inch bass limit will biologists hope, help prevent the boom and bust cycle that often occurs at newly impounded lakes.  
For determining legal length, measure fish from the end of the lower jaw to the longest tail fin. Underline fish must be released immediately and in the best possible condition.
