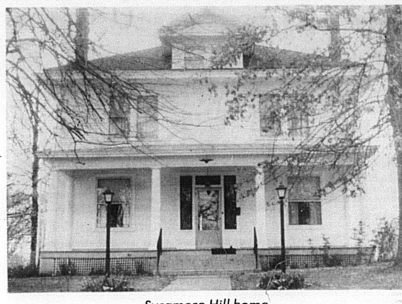
## Miss Kagen McEugene

## G.C. Myers home

Is next on June 5 historical tour

(Editor's note: This is listed in a series of features on homes to be toured Sunday, June 5, sponsored by the Nicholas County Historical Society. "I wanted it right then," says Mrs. G.C. Myers the first time she walked through their 265 Sycamore Hill home. Few homes have had the love and care through the years that the Myers' home has had. The house has had only two owners since it was built in 1871. Mr. Henry Carter, the original owner and president of the First National Bank, inspected every piece of lumber that went into it. He did so for a good reason: he brought his bride "Miss Christie" there.

Remains water

When built, the house was one of the most modern of its day: it boasted "running" water. A storage tank was located in the attic, and each day water had to be pumped up to it. There was a laundry chute in the basement and the pump's water box was connected to the back porch so the live man could make deliveries without disturbing anyone. In back there were cows, chickens and even a tennis court.

Mrs. Carter was very particular about her house was kept. Even as she grew older, she was constantly repairing and repainting. She made a point to go into every room each day. "A house must be lived in," she often said.

You felt like it had been lived in, says Mrs. Myers when they purchased it after Mrs. Carter's death in 1975. So renovating the house was not as big a task as one would imagine. A den and new kitchen (without an in-betwixt) were added to the rear.

The original part of the house was repainted when Mrs. Myers' favorite colors of blue and gold. She dropped old wallpaper brand. Chandeliers were added and in the dining room one light fixture was hung beneath a mirror from the Carlisle Drug, which Myers owns. Marble in the den fireplace also came from the drug store.

The Myers purchased several pieces of furniture originally with the house. A living room couch and chair belonged to the Carters, as did a mahogany dresser and washstand. Another bedroom suit sits exactly as Mrs. Carter had it.

**COINED BREAD ROLLS**  
1 (1 1/2-cup) can corned beef  
1 package soft rolls  
1/4 cup cold water  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup mayonnaise  
1 medium onion, grated  
3 tablespoons horseradish  
Salt and pepper  
Toss onion in cold water. Add hot water and mayonnaise, and then corned beef which has been broken up fine. Add other ingredients. Mix; garnish with parsley and serve with party pie. (Never fails to make a hit with both men and women.)

**CHILI MOLD**  
1 (10 1/2-oz.) can tomato soup  
1/4 cup chili sauce  
1 (8-oz.) package cream cheese  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup chopped celery  
1 (16-oz.) can crab meat, drained and checked for shell  
1 cup mayonnaise  
2 envelope gelatin  
Dash Worcestershire sauce  
Pinch of celery and onion salt  
Dissolve gelatin in 1/4 cup cold water. Heat soup, chili sauce, mayonnaise and cream cheese. Add gelatin and rest of ingredients and crab meat. Stir until mayonnaise and cheese are smooth. Pour into 3/4 cup mold. Let cool if you have it, or any mold topped with salad. Put in refrigerator until set. Remove from mold just before serving.
