**Kentucky Afield Bath, Menifee have turkey season**

Turkey hunting isn't widely popular in Kentucky, yet. But if the hopes of wildlife biologists in the Bluegrass State are realized, increasing turkey populations will cause more and more hunters to take up this challenging sport in the future.

It is no accident that turkey numbers are increasing in Kentucky. Since 1978, the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has been engaged in a major turkey restoration effort.

The speed at which this can be accomplished depends, to a large measure, on the availability of turkey. For successful restoration, birds must be captured from the wild, transported quickly to their new home and released. Numerous experiments have shown that stocked pen-reared turkeys just don't work — the birds cannot make their own way in the woods after being cared for by humans.

The commonwealth's turkey population now stands at approximately 7,000, more than double the estimated population of 2,000 in the state when the restoration project began five years ago. Newly stocked wildlife populations generally grow slowly at first, "explode" when the density reaches a certain level and the rapid growth of the state's deer herd in recent years is a good example.

But turkey prey will never have as many turkeys as we do deer. Wild turkeys prefer large, undisturbed areas with a minimum of human interference. They will probably never make the way deer seem to have done.

Turkey hunting in Kentucky is confined to relatively few areas at the present, but other counties have been stocked and will be opened to hunting when populations grow sufficiently. The 1983 spring season runs from April 13 through May 1, and at Ft. Knox, the last two weekends in March and all weekends in April except April 30, an military training schedule permit. Hunters are limited to one turkey gobbler with visible beard per year.

**Blue mold**

Conducted tests with isolates of the blue mold fungus and soil and plant tissues collected from the plots, they found the fungus was still sensitive to Ridomil, but little or no Ridomil could be found on the leaves.

The phenomenon is called "runaway" and, "Nemuth explained. Usually it was not detected unless the crop had been in the field 75 days or longer, except on sites high in organic matter such as old barn lots or feed lots where, in a few cases, significant activity was reported within 30 days of the application.

Generally, significant crop damage was not reported from running out situations, except where very favorable blue mold weather prevailed late in the season," said Nemuth. "In those later cases, heavy damage was reported."

Because of the "runaway" phenomenon and the timing of most blue mold development in Kentucky, Nemuth questions whether the state's tobacco growers should apply all the Ridomil at the crop at once. He said that better timing of the fungicide applications could eliminate problems if weather favorable to blue mold persisted late in the cropping season.
